LIST OF VACANCIES

In the Free State Scholarships in the State Agricultural and Mechanical College, July 1, 1890

The method of appointment to these Scholarships is fixed by the Code, sections 327 to 329. This method is, briefly, as follows:

The State Superintendent issues notices to the County and City Superintendents in the month of May of each year, requiring them to hold examinations of candidates for appointments in their respective counties or cities, and giving directions as to these examinations.

The County and City Superintendents are required to give public notice and to hold such examinations as may be necessary during the month of June. From the list of candidates found qualified and numbered in the order of merit, each State Senator and Representative can appoint two young men to Scholarships in the University. State Senators and Representatives can appoint other persons not on this list, but in doing so they take the responsibility for their preparation. The students thus appointed must be at least fifteen years of age, and prepared to enter regular collegiate classes. Senators and Representatives are requested to make their appointments subject to these competitive examinations of applicants by the County or City Superintendents of Public Schools.

In order that no worthy young men who pass these examinations may fail to get the advantages of the University, the President of the University is authorized by law to appoint such qualified candidates to any vacancies which may remain to be filled in any county or district on the 10th of August of each year.

REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION.

I. IN THE COLLEGE.

Candidates must have credentials of good character and be at least fifteen years of age.

For the Freshman classes of the Scientific and Engineering courses there is required: 1. A good knowledge of English Grammar and Composition. 2. A thorough knowledge of Arithmetic and its applications, of Algebra to quadratics, and of the first three books of Geometry. 3. A good knowledge of Geography and U. S. History. For the Freshman Latin-scientific course there is required, in addition, a knowledge of the forms, declensions, genders, conjugations, &c., in Latin, and ability to read the simpler prose writers. Candidates must pass a satisfactory examination in two out of three of the branches above. Opportunity will be given those conditioned in Algebra, Geometry and Latin to make up these studies.

Examinations for Admission, at the University, at the opening of each term, Sept 15 to 18, and February 9 to 12.

The preparatory department has been abolished.

II. IN THE UNIVERSITY.

- 1. Special or Elective students must be 21, and pass satisfactory examinations on Rhetoric, General History, Algebra, and Geometry, in addition to the above. Graduates of respectable Colleges are admitted on their diplomas.
- 2. Law students must be 19 years of age and have a good English education.
