## Ballentine facilitates corporate, foundation support

The Office of Research is reaching out to corporations and private foundations in an effort to win support for research projects and other sponsored programs.

Susan Ballentine, a 17-year veteran of UTK's Development Office, has worked in the Office of Research for two years to identify corporate sponsors and private foundations interested in supporting university initiatives.

"We are seeking to put potential sponsors from corporations and foundations in touch with faculty whose scholarly interests match the

sponsors' needs," Ballentine said. "We work to arrange for corporate and foundation representatives to visit campus so we can make introductions to our faculty."

Through Ballentine's efforts, representatives of the American Cancer Society visited campus and met with scientists whose research matched ACS interests. She has made contact with organizations as diverse as Teledyne Brown Engineering, Energy Solutions, EADS, Remotec, Sisken Steel & Supply, and Camel Canvas.

Ballentine also facilitated support for UT's entry into the Solar Decathlon sponsored by the U.S. Department of Energy. With assistance from a number of national and regional firms, the UT Living Light house placed eighth overall and took first place in two categories in a national competition that was staged recently on the National Mall in Washington, D.C.

One major part of Ballentine's portfolio includes liaison responsibilities between the university and the Y-12 National Security Complex. Ballentine serves as the UT counterpart to Debbie Reed, the B&W Y-12 director of liaison with the university. UT and Y-12 are seeking to share expertise and educational and research opportunities among faculty, students, and weapons-plant staff.

Ballentine and Reed have already contacted several UT colleges about collaborations with Y-12 and they will talk with the remaining colleges soon.

"Faculty who have a specific idea for a corporate or foundation contact can let me know, and I will begin the process of making the connection and building relationships," she said.

### TEPO fund added to SARIF arsenal of support

The Office of Research has created to new fund to support faculty who need to meet program managers at federal agencies, corporations, and foundations.

The Travel to Engage Program Officers (TEPO) Fund will cover one-third of transportation expenses for faculty (including tenure-track and research) who are visiting program officers of funding agencies. Faculty seeking TEPO aid must submit a detailed description of the proposed meeting(s) or conference.

Requests for TEPO support will be reviewed when received by the associate vice chancellor for research.

TEPO is part of the Scholarly and Research Incentives Funds (SARIF) program, which offers funding to faculty members whose departments fall under the chancellor of UT Knoxville.

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### UTRF accepting proposals for Maturation Fund

The UT Research Foundation is seeking proposals for its Maturation Funding Program.

UTRF will provide up to \$15,000 for projects related to an existing UT invention or creation disclosure, or to an invention/creation disclosure submitted at the same time as the Maturation Fund proposal.

Projects should provide new data or further demonstrate the proposed technology to increase its commercial readiness. The UTRF support must be used on direct costs -- labor, materials, and services necessary to demonstrate the project.

Proposals are limited to three pages that describe the technology, the plan of work, expected results, a budget, and an assessment of the commercial opportunities for the technology.

#### Faculty with NSF funding can apply for undergraduate supplement


UT Knoxville faculty who have funding from the National Science Foundation are eligible to apply for supplemental funding that will provide Research Experiences for Undergraduates as part of their



### **Faculty nominations** for Scholar of the Week





- Publication of original research in rigorously refereed major journals
- A major exhibit or performance at a national or international venue
- ❖ A record of national grant or fellowship support awarded through peer-review
- National or international prizes or awards
- Invitation to hold endowed lectureships
- Invited lectures, particularly at major scholarly meetings

Faculty members may be nominated only by deans, department heads, and other faculty members. Nominations should include a short paragraph that includes the department and rank of the scholar, states his or her specific field of work within the discipline, and describes the scholar's most recent noteworthy accomplishment. The paragraph may also list significant previous scholarly awards and memberships.

Please send your nominations to Alan Rutenberg at arutenberg@ utk.edu and provide a photograph or a link to a photograph. Descriptions should be in simple, nontechnical language for a general audience, but when relevant they should also include citations for the benefit of other scholars.

#### Gates Foundation calls for work on preterm births, healthy babies

The Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation is investing \$35 million in support of groundbreaking projects that will help women and children live more prosperous and healthy lives.

The funding will support two new Grand Challenges in Global Health programs: Preventing Preterm Birth and Discover New Ways to Achieve Healthy Growth.

The birth initiative, undertaken in cooperation with the Global Alliance for the Prevention of Prematurity and Stillbirth, will seek to support research that limits infections and improves nutrition for pregnant women.

The healthy growth initiative will study growth issues in the first 1,000 days of life and effective and affordable interventions that promote healthy growth.

A related initiative, "Biomarkers of Gut Function and Health," will seek noninvasive measures of intestinal functioning in infants.
