Eighmy takes post in research office

A research administrator from Texas Tech University has become the vice chancellor of research and engagement for the University of Tennessee, Knoxville.

Taylor Eighmy had been in research administration at Texas Tech since 2009, most recently as senior vice president for research.

"It is an honor and privilege to join the the University of Tennessee community," said Eighmy. "There is immense potential here and the opportunity to aspire to big ideas associated with being a Top 25 research university is very compelling.

"This university can be a real exemplar for what a great public research university can be. I look forward to working with the faculty, department heads, deans, senior administrators, and our external partners to realize these aspirations."

At Texas Tech, Eighmy led an initiative to qualify the university as a National Research University under Texas law and recruited distinguished senior faculty in the STEM disciplines. He also launched an internal competition to support excellence in the creative arts, humanities, and the social sciences.

Eighmy has PhD and master's degrees in civil and environmental engineering from the University of New Hampshire, where he was also a research professor and founding director of the school's environmental and recycled materials research groups. His undergraduate degree in biology is from Tufts University.

Eighmy will also provide campus leadership for UT's growing engagement portfolio, with particular focus on engaged outreach and other partnering opportunities.

Eighmy takes the post from Lee Riedinger, physics professor and director of the Bredesen Center for Interdisciplinary Research and Graduate Education, who has served as interim vice chancellor for the past year.

UT hosts special NSF communications workshop

2nd day of program targets invitation-only researchers

A National Science Foundation communications workshop designed to improve the public communications skills of researchers will be held on the University of Tennessee campus on November 7 and 8, 2012.

"Science: Becoming the Messenger" is designed to help university researchers at all experience and education levels communicate effectively with a broad public. TN-SCORE and the UT Office of Research are cohosting the event.

Workshop events on November 7 will be open to principal investigators, early-career researchers, postdocs, and graduate students from universities, colleges, and other research-related institutions in Tennessee. Public information officers at Tennessee institutions of higher education are also invited to attend.

Sessions on November 8 will be limited to a small group of specially selected researchers who will be helped to refine their message further and trained to talk effectively with their colleagues, public audiences, and the media. There is no registration fee, but preregistration is required. The workshop will take place in the Ray Mears Room of Thompson-Boling Arena.

Requirements: Participants must bring a laptop for both days, create a Twitter account prior to the workshop, commit to attend the November 7 workshop for the entire day, and, if chosen, commit to attend the November 8 workshop for the entire day.

The program is offered by the NSF as part of its efforts to make the state's colleges and universities more competitive in winning federal support for research. TN-SCORE — the Tennessee Solar Conversion and Storage using Outreach, Research, and Education program — is supported by the NSF's Experimental Program to Stimulate Competitive Research (EPSCoR).

Millionth Trace download is paper on voting

An honors thesis by a University of Tennessee law student became a milestone on September 25 for Trace, the Tennessee Research and Creative Exchange.

Daniel Steven Roberts' paper, "Why We Don't Vote: Low Voter Turnout in U.S. Presidential Elections," was the one-millionth download from Trace, the University Libraries' digital archives. In total Roberts' thesis was downloaded 78 times.

Other popular titles downloaded around the milestone include "Employers Asking for Social Media Passwords," a short paper by Bonnie Jones from the Municipal Technical Advisory Service, and another Chancellor's Honors paper, "The 'Indie' Sound: A Band's Guide to Success in the Competitive Indie Market. An Evaluation of Touring Trends & Tricks of the Trade" by Nicole Stratman.

Trace is an archive for scholarly work produced by the UT community, including faculty members looking for a place to share their scholarship and research, and students seeking to preserve their best work. Launched in September 2009, the archive now includes some 14,750 articles, data sets, multimedia works, and image collections from UT sources, more than half of them downloaded in the past year.

Library statistics show that use of Trace is growing. More than 60 percent of the downloads have occurred in the last 12 months.

Toilet makeover enters third phase

The Gates Foundation is soliciting letters of inquiry for round three of its Reinvent the Toilet Challenge. The foundation will award grants to exceptional research groups interested in contributing major advances in human sanitation in the developing world.

Successful applicants will design, prototype, and test entirely stand-alone, self-contained, practical sanitation modules that take in bodily wastes or fecal sludge and dispose of them swiftly without incoming water piping, outgoing sewer piping, or electric or gas utility services. Solutions for both family and neighborhood modules must take into account assured biosafety.
