Recent Accomplishments at UTK...

University's Programs Among Nation's Best

U.S. News & World Report 1998 rankings placed UTK 44th among the nation's best public universities. The report also ranked UTK third among universities whose students graduate with the least amount of debt. Graduates of UTK had an average debt of \$6,532. Only graduates of Florida International University and Texas Tech University graduate with less debt, the magazine reported. Graduate programs in law, business, education and speech pathology were also cited: business was ranked 43rd of 300 schools surveyed; education ranked 48 of 191 schools surveyed; law ranked 48th of 174 schools surveyed; and speech pathology ranked 21st of 224 schools surveyed.

The World Resources Institute rated UTK's MBA program in environmental management one of the nation's 10 best among public and private institutions.

The logistics and transportation program in the College of Business Administration was ranked first in the nation in a survey of senior logistics executives conducted by a private firm. UTK ranked sixth among colleges and universities with the strongest marketing skills programs in a study by *Time/The Princeton Review*.

Kiplinger's Personal Finance Magazine ranked UTK a "Top 100" value among state universities -- 61st of 600 colleges and universities.

UTK Strengthens Commitment to Technology Upgrades

The \$100 per semester technology fee, begun in 1997, has already begun to reap big benefits for UTK students and faculty. The fee raises about \$5 million annually for networking infrastructure, technology upgrades, hardware and support for faculty and students. One thousand new computers were purchased for student use. The amount of fee-funded equipment, software, and projects was boosted by unexpected discounts, grants, and donations from computer manufacturers and other companies. By summer, 1998, internet connections were made to about 3,300 rooms in 13 campus residence halls serving about 7,000 students.

34 Freshman National Merit Scholars Choose UTK

UT Knoxville ranks 62nd among the nation's 3,700 public and private colleges in the number of freshman National Merit Scholars enrolled. The ranking is based on figures in the National Merit Scholarship Corporation's annual report. UTK enrolled 34 freshman National Merit Scholars and provided funding for 27. The remaining seven scholarships were funded by the National Merit organization or other corporate sponsors. Only Vanderbilt University, a private institution with 90 freshman Merit Scholars, outranked UTK among Tennessee colleges and universities. UTK has a total of 126 National Merit Scholars on campus. Nationally, there were 3,201 National Merit Scholars enrolled in 147 public institutions.

UTK Students Are Top Achievers

Travis Wright, a Whittle Scholar from Hamblen County, Tennessee, was one of 20 students named to *USA Today's* College Academic Team. Last year, Wright was named a Truman Scholar. In spring 1998, Wright was named one of seven Torchbearers, UTK's highest student award. He was a participant in the College Scholars Program which allowed him to develop his own degree path. His focus was on community development and organization.

The Southeastern Transportation Center recognized UTK's Jason Gregory of Memphis as the region's most outstanding graduate student. The award recognizes leadership, initiative, and professional promise in the field.

UTK nutrition students won two of the 12 awards for graduate research projects presented annually by the American Society for Nutritional Sciences. Kate Claycombe and Bingzhong Xue were awarded for their work in determining how the obesity gene works to regulate body fat. This is the fourth consecutive year that students from UTK's Department of Nutrition have received the national award.

Peyton Manning's outstanding quarterback accomplishments earned \$165,000 in scholarship funds and private donations to establish the Peyton Manning Scholarship endowment fund. These scholarships will go to first-year students chosen for academic achievement, leadership, and community service. The first Manning Scholar was Jay Burns, an honor student, senior class vice president, and star athlete from Greeneville (Tenn.) High School. Manning was a Heisman Trophy finalist, held 33 school football records and graduated cum laude in May, 1998, with a degree in speech communications. He was the No. 1 graduate in his major.

Vols Prove Athletic Prowess

The UTK Football Volunteers won the Southeastern Conference Championship in 1997 under the leadership of quarterback Peyton Manning. In spring, 1998, Chamique Holdscaw led the UTK Lady Vols basketball team to their third consecutive national championship, for a total of six national championships under Coach Pat Summitt. Both Manning and Holdscaw ended their seasons with numerous national honors.

Enrollment Reaches Five-year High

Fall, 1998 enrollment at UTK reached its highest level in five years. A total of 25,612 students registered -- up 573 from fall, 1997. Undergraduate enrollment was 19,693 -- up 632 over last year. Enrollment of African-American, first-time freshmen rose from 6.3 percent to a 10-year high of 7.3 percent. Admissions officials credit scholarships and strengthened recruiting efforts for the increase in high-quality students from all backgrounds.

Stacy announced that the university will dedicate more than \$4 million toward technological improvements, including more than \$3 million for fiber-optic wiring that will provide each campus office, classroom, and dorm room with internet and computer connections. 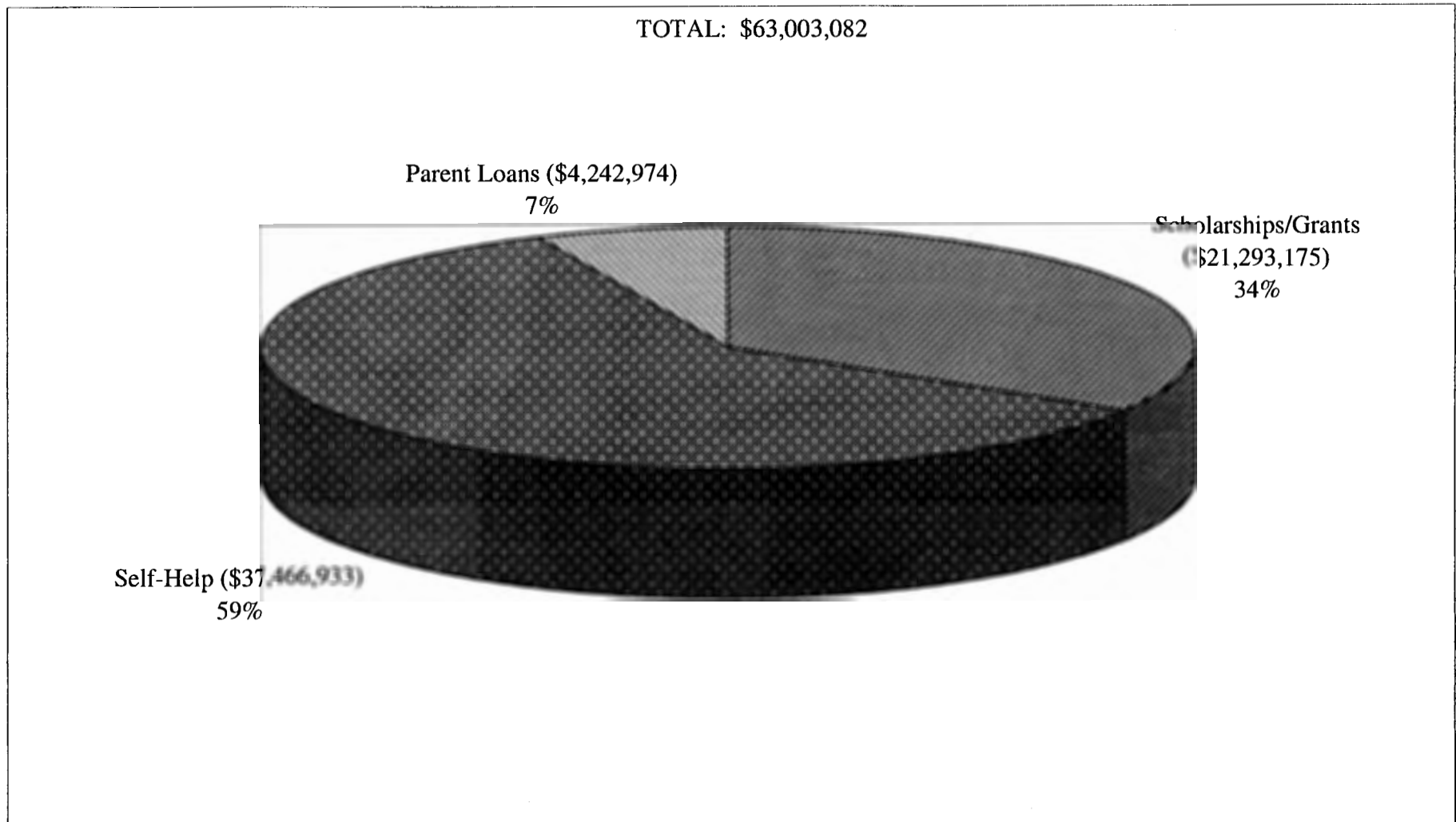

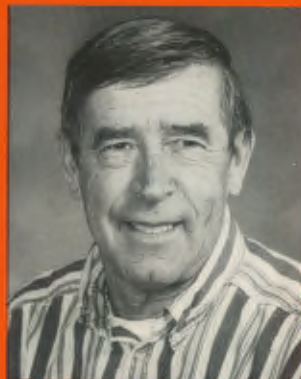

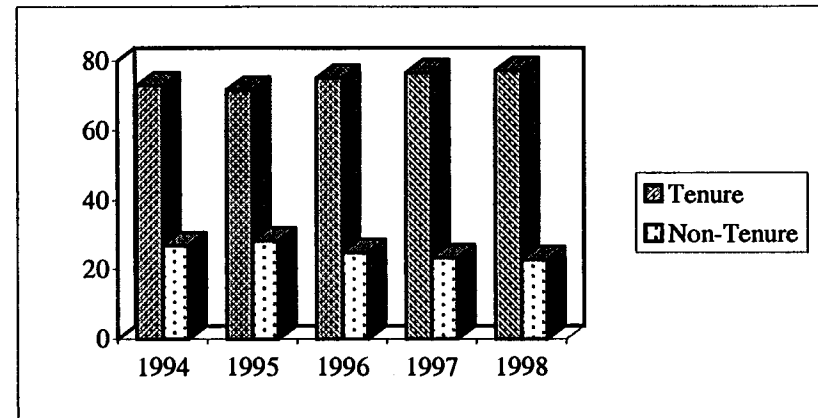
Best In Their Class . . .

A Presidential Legacy . . .

UTK is the only university in the U.S. to house three presidential papers projects. The three directors of the projects are (l-r): Dr. Harold Moser (Andrew Jackson Papers), Dr. Paul Bergeron (Andrew Johnson Papers), and Dr. Wayne Cutler (James K. Polk Papers). The Tennessee President's Center has published more than 25 volumes and in 1996 produced a video, *Voices for Union*, in which the three presidents tell their stories in words taken from actual speeches. This video and a study guide for teachers were distributed to public libraries and to the libraries of all Tennessee secondary schools, colleges and universities.

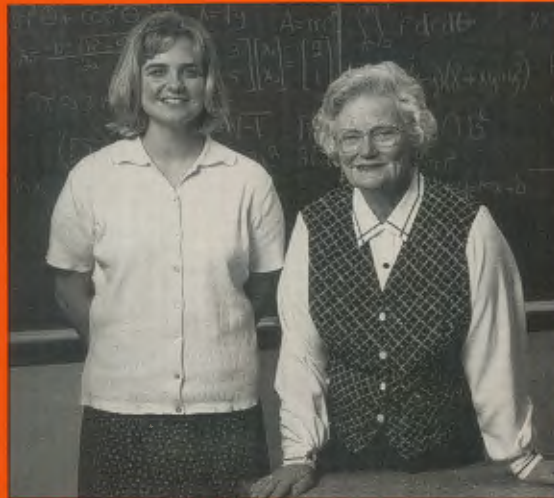
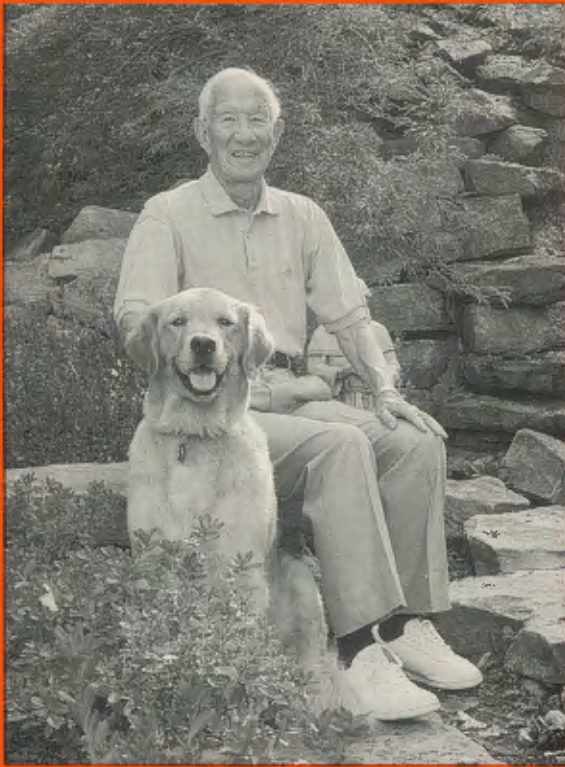

Hats Off to a 21st Century Innovator . . .

How do you recognize a man who has given so much to the Knoxville community and to UTK, his alma mater? It is not easy when that man prefers solitary walks and the company of a beloved dog to public accolades. Yet, in naming Lindsay Young a 21st Century Innovator, UTK pauses to recognize a man who has given so generously of himself and his resources. In 1980, Young gave \$1 million in securities to UT, the largest outright gift in the University's history up to that time. The gift established eight faculty professorships in the College of Arts and Sciences, and one each in the College of Law and the College of Veterinary Medicine. In 1989, Young gave \$1 million to the Tennessee Imperative Campaign for the University Library. The gift established the Lindsay Young Library Endowment and made possible the acquisition of the papers of Knoxville-born writer James Agee and first editions of Charles Dickens novels.

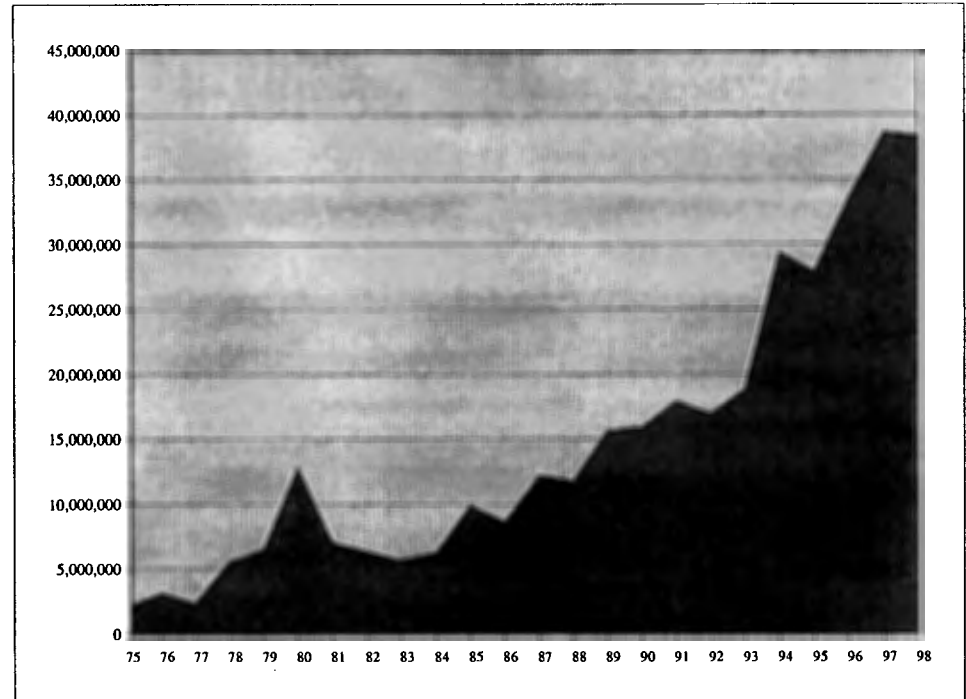

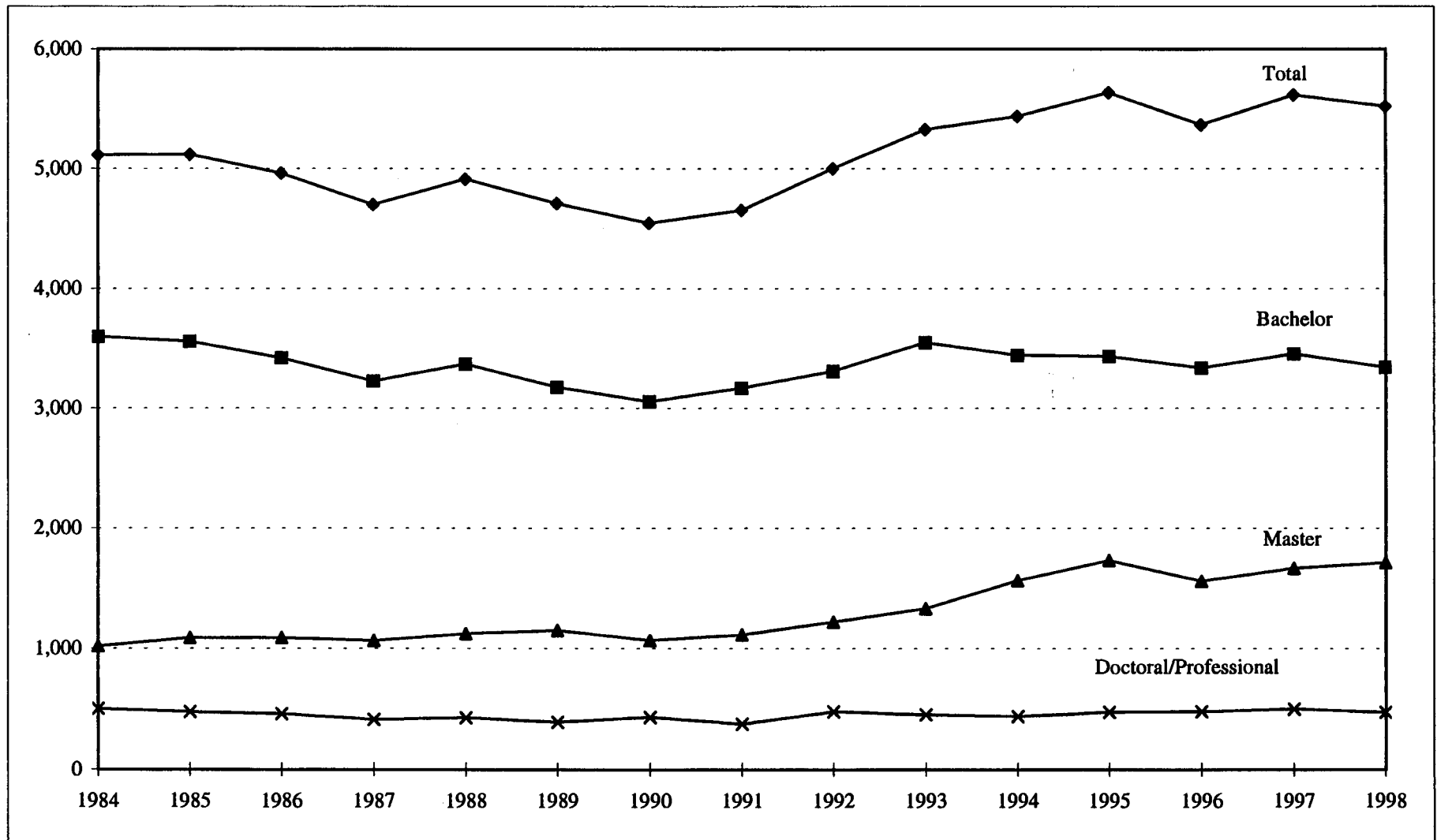

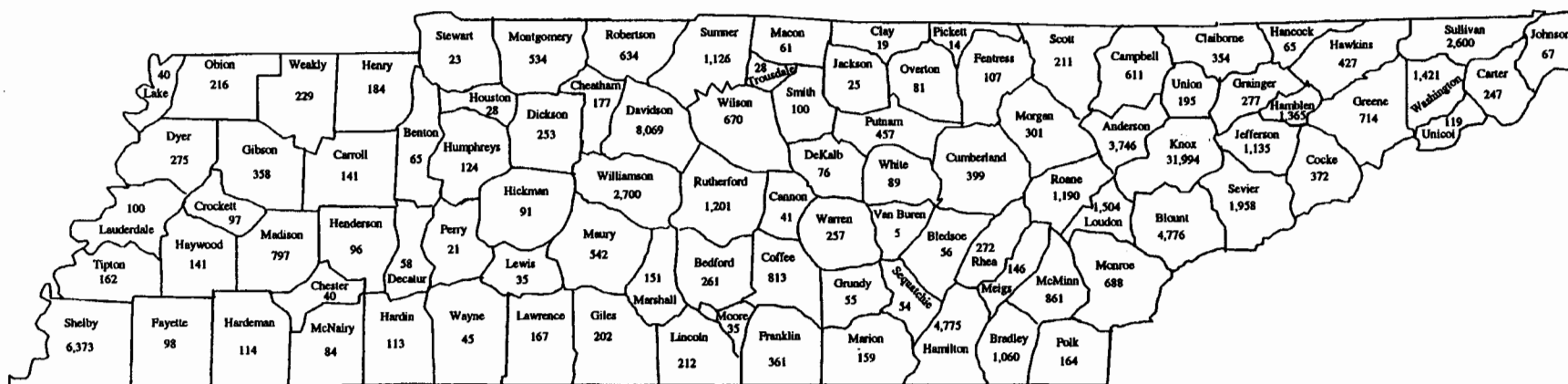

DISTRIBUTION OF UTK ALUMNI BY STATE



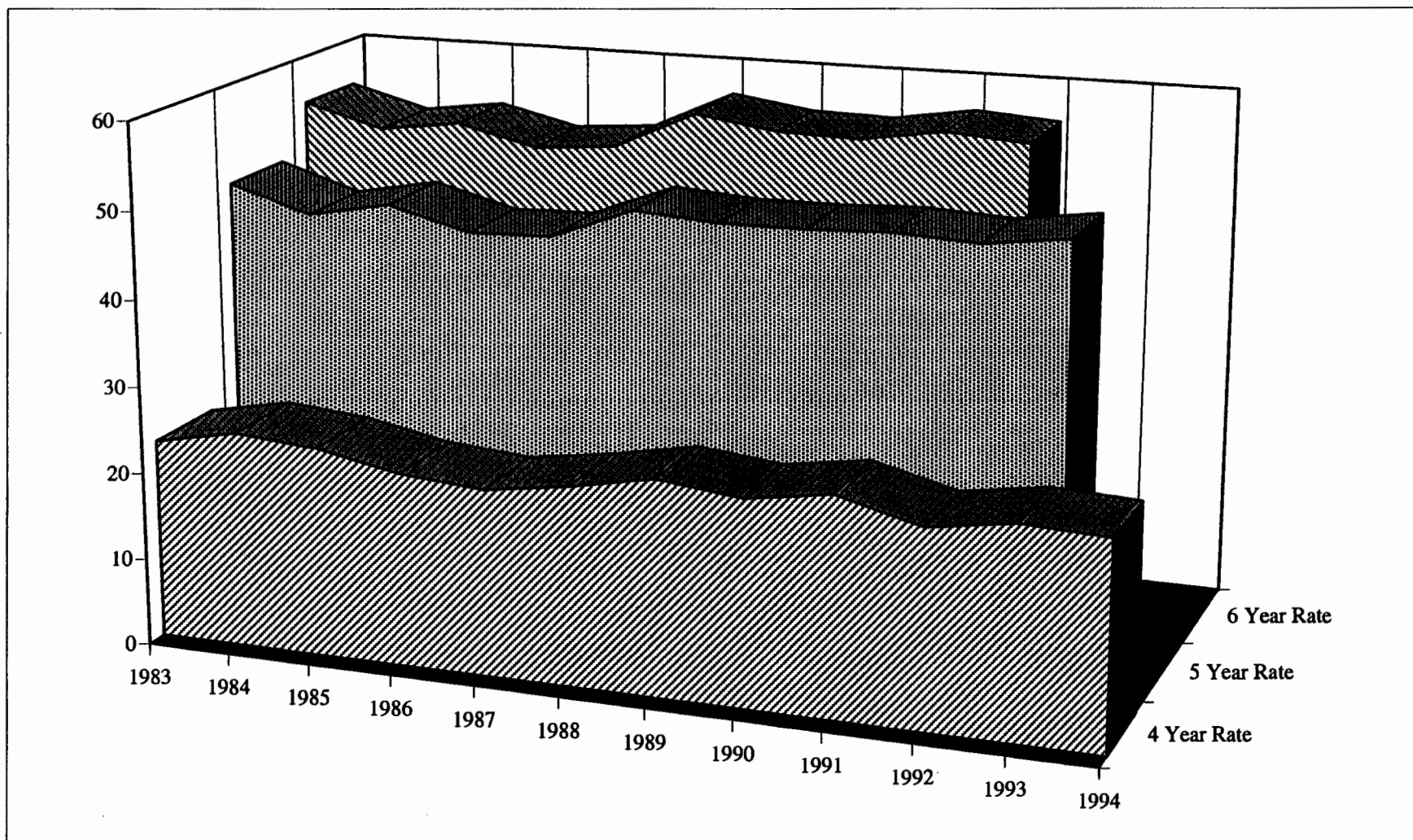

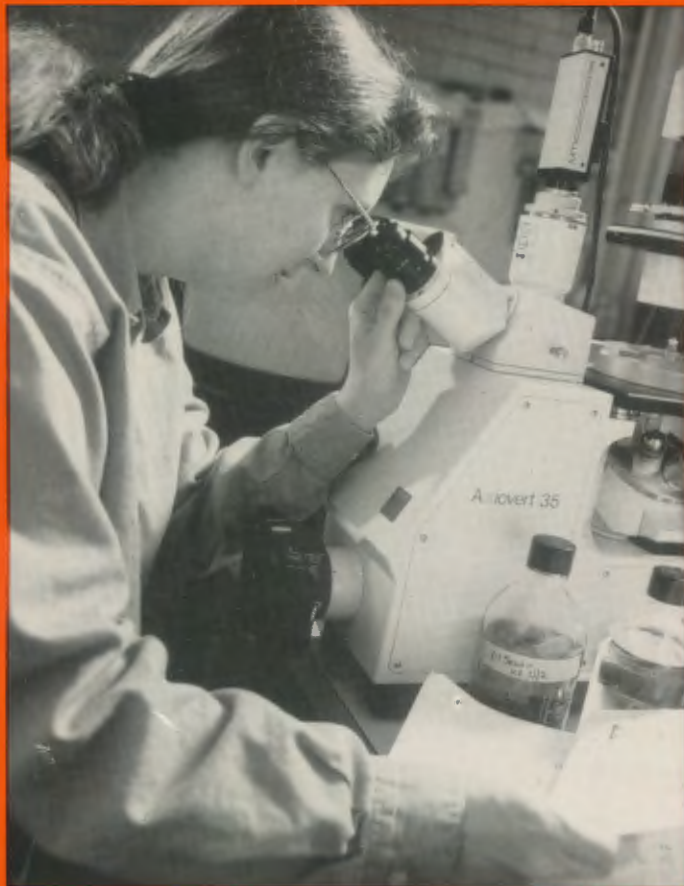

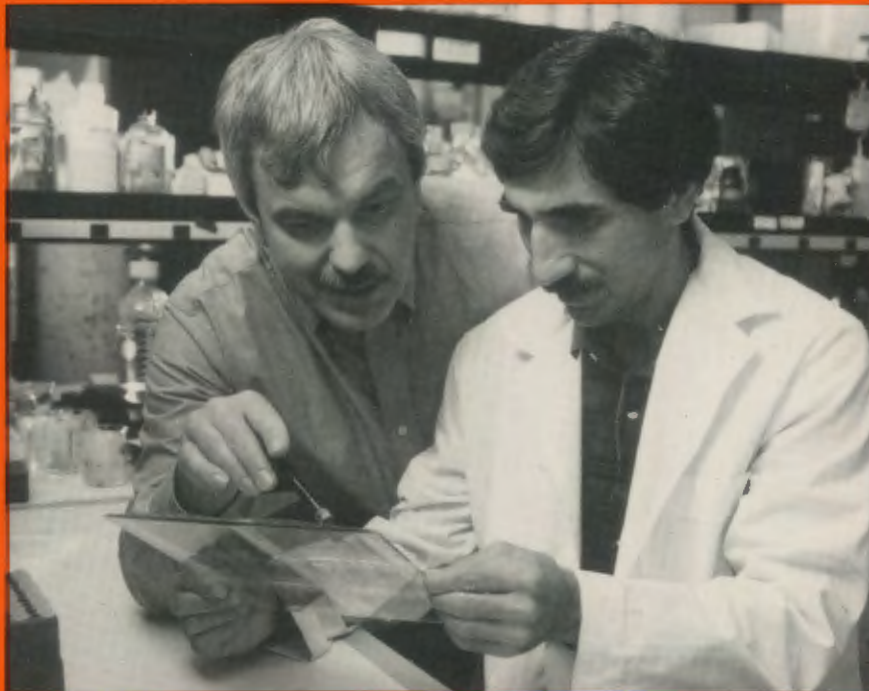

Research Yields Super Soybeans . . .

Dr. Peter Gresshoff (below, left) has patented a supernodulating soybean whose increased nitrogen-fixing capacity eliminates the need to add nitrogen fertilizer to the soil. He holds the UTK Racheff Chair of Excellence in Plant Molecular Genetics and is an internationally recognized plant geneticist.



Unlocking the Secrets of Heart Disease . . .

Dr. Judy Cezeaux, associate professor of Mechanical and Aerospace Engineering and Engineering Sciences, examines heart cells for her research into the causes of cardiovascular disease. The thickening of the heart wall, a major risk for heart failure, can be brought on by a process called mechanical loading in which there is an overload of blood pressure or volume. Dr. Cezeaux studies the effects of mechanical loading by physically stretching cardiac muscle and non-muscle cells to determine if heart wall thickening results from heightened pressure or from some other cause. She and other researchers have designed and constructed a mechanical stretching device which exposes cardiac cells to various degrees of stretch to model mechanical loading. It is hoped that this research will shed light on the origins of heart disease.

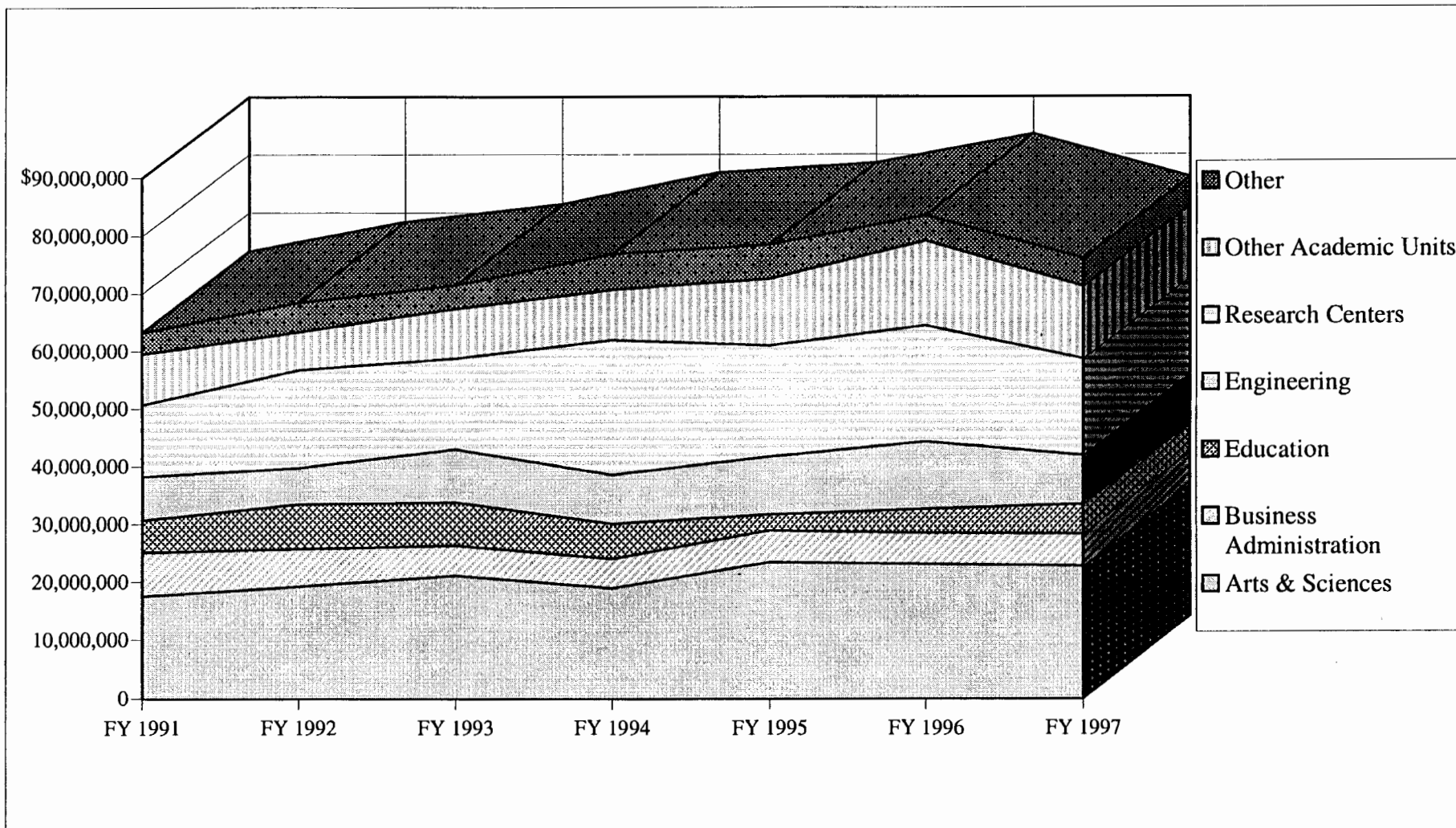

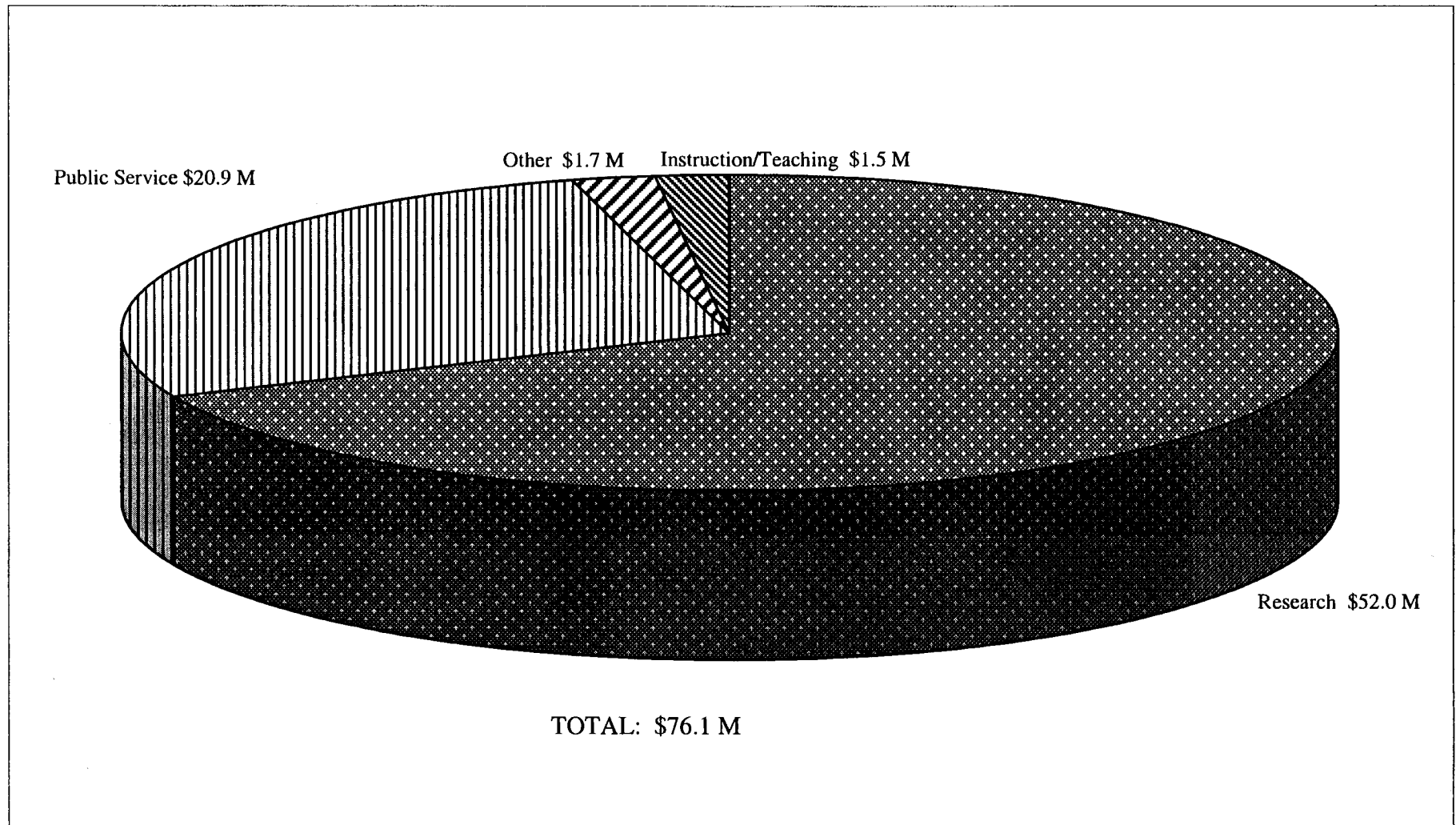
