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PREFACE

Welcome to the fifth annual <u>Fact Book</u> of the University of Tennessee, Knoxville. This edition commemorates the bicentennial of the founding of the University. Over the past 200 years, the institution has matured into one of the country's eminent state universities and land grant colleges. This compendium helps describe the "multiversity," as former University of California President Clark Kerr has described the modern university, into which UTK has evolved.

As with all the previous issues, the staff of the Office of Institutional Research is grateful for the assistance we receive from our colleagues who collect and maintain the various university data bases. The amount of effort required to manage the information of the university is not always fully appreciated. Most of the tables and graphs herein identify the source from whom more detailed information may be obtained.

It is our goal with each new edition of the <u>Fact Book</u> to amend its contents so that the information can be more useful to you, the reader. Toward that end, we appreciate and welcome your comments and advice on how this document may be improved to better serve your needs.

Celebrating our past . . .

The University of Tennessee marked its Bicentennial in 1994 with a wave of celebrations that began on the UTK campus and rolled across the state. A special symbol was designed to mark the occasion, followed by everything from Bicentennial mementos to medallions, lapel pins to lectures, T-shirts to TV spots, chocolates to commemorative prints, billboards to books, and soft drink bottles to sculptures.

More than 5,000 attended the Bicentennial breakfast kickoff event, as did hundreds more at other UT campuses via satellite television transmissions. Tennessee Governor Ted McWherter praised the University and announced that he would recommend funding for the new College of Law building at UTK. The band played, and fireworks flew.

Just two days earlier, the Tennessee General Assembly met in special session to recognize UT's Bicentennial by passing a joint resolution praising the accomplishments of the state's land-grant university. Tennessee Senators Jim Sasser and Harlan Mathews added a resolution to the *Congressional Record* marking the University's Bicentennial. A traveling exhibit featuring historic UT photographs brought the University's story to the people of Tennessee. Our first electronic information kiosk, featuring Bicentennial events, went into operation. Across the state, the other campuses and institutes of the UT system celebrated with events of their own.

The festivities were well deserved. The frontier college that began with a handful of students and one teacher has become five campuses with 40,000 students and 18,000 faculty and staff. The library that consisted of one teacher's personal collection now holds 2 million volumes and is one of the top 100 research libraries in the nation. Among UT graduates are one Nobel laureate, six Rhodes Scholars, five Pulitzer Prize winners, two National Book Award winners, one associate justice of the U.S. Supreme Court and one chief of staff to the President of the United States.

. . . while focusing on our future

The Volunteer spirit is not tied to past accomplishments. New challenges in teaching, research and service await us in our third century. To meet these challenges, the University has launched a five-year campaign to raise an unprecedented \$250 million for UT and \$130 for UTK by 1998. In addition, each campus and institute of UT has established a new five-year plan.

Goals for the state-wide University are:

Public awareness that UT is a high-quality institution;

Extending UT's reputation for quality to national and international scope;

An ever-improving quality of students entering and graduating from the University;

Selecting outstanding new faculty and honoring and rewarding the current excellent faculty;

Greater achievement by those UT units engaged in research;

A more intimate and vital partnership with Tennessee agriculture, business, arts, industry and government.

During the University's Bicentennial year, UTK continued to foster the ideals on which the University was founded. Following are just a few of the recent initiatives to improve education, research and service at UTK.

Campus Climate Issues . . .

Efforts to make UTK an even better place for students could be seen in a couple of major projects. Registration was streamlined and improved by a committee of staff and students. In another student effort, a 13-member task force focused on ways to improve students' first-year experience at UTK. The focus continued on campus climate issues with the Gender in the Workplace Survey which reported on perceptions about professional opportunities for women on campus, sexual harassment, safety and child care. Chancellor William T. Snyder and his staff also completed and released an update of the process on implementing the 1988 Task Force on Race Relations. The chancellor's "Climate Paper" pledged UTK's commitment to cultivating and enriching the human mind and spirit, developing its human resources and repudiating discrimination.

Industry Partnerships . . .

Forging partnerships with business and industry was a major thrust at UTK. Pilot Corporation signed a partnership agreement to work with UTK on environmental issues, continuing and executive education, telecommunications, and information technology. Fifty faculty and staff spent three days at Eastman Chemical Company headquarters in Kingsport, learning about the firm's quality improvement program.

Research . . .

University researchers attracted record funding for scholarly pursuits. UTK's research expenditures in fiscal 1994 were \$77.7 million, up almost \$10 million from the previous year. Most of the money comes from federal and state contracts, grants, state appropriations, institutional support, industry and private sources.

Development . . .

In the area of private giving, the University received its largest gift ever, about \$12 million, from the estate of Hollywood Director Clarence Brown, establishing an endowment for the theater department. Vice President Al Gore announced \$1 million in state and private funding for the Nancy Gore Chair of Excellence in Environmental Studies, in honor of his late sister.

RECENT HIGHLIGHTS: UT-Chattanooga celebrated its 25th anniversary as the statewide University marked its Bicentennial. UTC left the ranks of private institutions in 1969 to join UT. Major grants are funding: research on petroleum underground storage tanks; a computer network to link rural school districts with national and international information highways; a mentoring program for school children; and arts education. Students and faculty studied manufacturing and management in Japan. Two new master's degree programs — nurse anesthesia and nurse practitioner — will address critical shortages in the U.S. health care industry. A new Legal Assistance Studies program was launched in the School of Social and Community services. The Challenger Learning and Teaching Center, a high-tech hands-on space flight designed to make learning science and math fun for children, opened on the UTC campus.

The National Science Foundation awarded a grant of nearly \$50,000 to the Center of Excellence for Science and Mathematics Education to improve how science is taught in elementary schools. The American Chemical Society student chapter was rated outstanding for the 16th consecutive year. The Phi Chi Theta Professional Business Fraternity rated the UT-Martin student chapter the best chapter in the U.S. Professor Choong Soon Kim, Department of Sociology and Anthropology, obtained a second Fullbright grant to teach and to do research in Korea. A \$300,000 gift from former Gov. Ned McWherter will fund the Lucille and Harmon McWherter Scholarship Endowment. The Golightly Foundation pledged \$300,000 for the Golightly Education Research and Teaching Center.

RECENT HIGHLIGHTS: The American Association of Medical Colleges ranked UT-Memphis 21st among the nation's 127 medical schools in the percentage of graduates entering primary care specialities. The Colleges of Medicine and Pharmacy were ranked in the top 10 in the nation for the past two years by *U.S. News and World Report's Guide to Graduate Schools*. National Institutes of Health recognized the College of Dentistry as a model institution for involving predoctoral students in basic biomedical and clinical research. Other programs address the training of physicians and nurse practitioners for underserved areas of the state. The Crippled Children's Foundation gave \$5 million for a Crippled Children's Foundation Research Center. A \$1 million gift will allow the Department of Physiology and Biophysics to renovate laboratories for cellular and molecular research and fund further study of Parkinson's Disease. An additional \$3.2 million from the Estate of Memphis businessman Ben Spears will fund the Spears Research Laboratory, an addition to the Van Vleet Cancer Center.



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
TOTAL ENROLLMENT BY LEVEL, FULL AND PART TIME FOR FALL 1990-94


FIRST-TIME FRESHMEN ENROLLMENT BY COLLEGE AND SEX FOR FALL 1990-94



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

Many prominent people were asked to contribute as was Thomas Jefferson, who declined, citing a personal rule "never to engage in a lottery or any other adventure of mere chance," even for noble purposes.











ALUMNI GEOGRAPHIC DISTRIBUTION BY STATE FOR KNOXVILLE CAMPUS




DISTRIBUTION OF KNOXVILLE CAMPUS ALUMNI BY TENNESSEE COUNTY

GRADUATION RATES FOR FIRST-TIME FULL-TIME FRESHMEN FOR FALL TERMS 1981-1990 (graph)










