Recent Accomplishments at UTK . . .

UTK was cited by **U.S. News & World Report** as the seventh best educational buy among U.S. universities.

Three UTK master's programs ranked in the **U.S. News & World Report** Top 50: business administration, education and law.

Dr. Gerald Mahan was elected to the National Academy of Sciences, the first UTK faculty member ever to earn that honor. Mahan is a UT-Oak Ridge National Laboratory Distinguished Scientist. He holds a joint appointment in the UTK physics department and the ORNL Solid State Division. Mahan was the first UT/ORNL Distinguished Scientist, joining UTK's Science Alliance in 1984.

The Engineering Manpower Commission ranked UTK among the nation's top institutions producing black engineering graduates.

The National Endowment for the Humanities awarded UTK libraries \$250,000 to locate, catalogue and preserve on microfilm all Tennessee newspapers, including those dating to the 18th century. It is anticipated that it will take the Tennessee Newspaper Project seven to eight years to complete the task.

UTK is attracting Tennessee's best and brightest students, with 30 McWhorter Scholars, 25 Tennessee Scholars, 10 Whittle Scholars, 145 Bicentennial Scholars, and 20 African-American Achiever Scholars enrolled for Fall Semester, 1995. The University Honors Program had 140 students enrolled for Fall Semester, almost triple the size of the previous year's class.

A growing number of National Merit Scholars select UTK as their first-choice institution. Thirty-eight enrolled in 1994-95 and 43 chose UTK for the 1995-96 academic year.

Kristey Reimann, a McClanahan Scholar in the UTK College of

Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources was one of four U.S. students chosen by the American Soybean Association to intern in Moscow.

Enrollment in the College of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources increased for the sixth consecutive year and stands at 1,278.

In the fall of 1995, UT reached 80 percent of its \$250 million 21st Century Campaign goal, twelve months after it was announced.

UT endowments have grown from \$50 million to \$350 million since 1982, a 600 percent increase.

A team of UTK undergraduate nuclear engineering students won first place in a national student design contest sponsored by the American Nuclear Society.

The five agencies of UTK's Institute for Public Service responded to more than 41,000 requests for information or assistance from government and business.

EdNet is extending UT courses and other training by providing two-way TV and two-way audio. Campus continuing education divisions electronically extend degree programs, credit courses, and non-credit professional development programs to adult students in Tennessee. Statewide, UT has twelve classrooms, three conference rooms, one auditorium, and two multipurpose facilities connected via telephone lines and multipoint switches. This technology allows UTK to extend its social work degree program to Nashville and Memphis; the graduate program in library and information science to Memphis; the M.S. degree in communications to Chattanooga; and the graduate program in audiology and speech pathology to teachers in Knoxville, Oak Ridge, Chattanooga and Tullahoma.



The \$28 million, 119,000 square foot Science-Engineering Building has a commanding position on "The Hill." Slated for opening in early 1996, the building will contain a time capsule featuring student life in the 1990s which will be opened on UT's 250th anniversary in the year 2044.

RECENT HIGHLIGHTS: UTC received a \$525,00 federal grant to fund Chattanooga Project Success which targets welfare recipients for job training. UTC professors from social work, criminal justice, nursing and psychology will participate in the program. The number of students enrolled in UTC graduate studies increased 32 percent in the period 1989-1994. The West Chair of Excellence, held by Dr. David Sachsman, sponsored a national conference on "Communication and Our Environment." The two-day event included speakers from throughout the nation. Engineering professor James Henry was one of 40 experts at a NATO Advanced Research Workshop in Kaliningrad, Russia, where participants discussed the dumping of chemical weapons since World War II. UTC's English department initiated a 10-week intensive English language program to assist international students and foreign business people.

RECENT HIGHLIGHTS: UT-Martin has been a part of UT since 1927. The campus graduation rate was at its highest level ever during 1994-95, and UT-Martin ranked second among Tennessee public universities in graduating students. UT-Martin ranked as the safest campus community in the state and the sixth safest in the U.S., according to *Crime at College: Student Guide to Personal Safety*. The West Tennessee Agricultural Pavilion, stalling facility, and proposed swine feed and grain research center was named the Ned McWherter Agricultural Complex. The Kathleen and Tom Elam Center was dedicated. The Elams announced an additional \$700,000 bequest to UT-Martin, which brings the Elams' total donations to \$1 million.

RECENT HIGHLIGHTS: The College of Nursing was ranked as the best faculty practice in the nation by the National Organization of Nurse Practitioner Faculties. Department of Anatomy & Neurobiology was ranked 19th (out of 99 and only one of Southern universities in Top 20) in regard to extramural research funding. Department of Physiology & Biophysics was ranked third best in total extramural funding of similar departments nationally. The College of Medicine's Underserved Areas Clinical Scholars Program now includes 120 students with 17% of the student body having made a commitment to train in primary care and practice in an underserved area of Tennessee. The College of Pharmacy's educational program was nationally recognized in the Top 10 for the third consecutive year by *U.S. News & World Report's* graduate school guide. Five College of Pharmacy alums were included in *Drug Store News* ranking of the 100 most influential pharmacists in the U.S. College of Pharmacy graduates for the sixth consecutive year achieved 100% pass rate on the National Board Exams. A \$300,000 grant from Assisi Foundation of Memphis will renovate research space for a Center for Oral Cancer Research and Education. A \$1 million endowment in pathology (half given by pathology faculty) will fund cancer research.

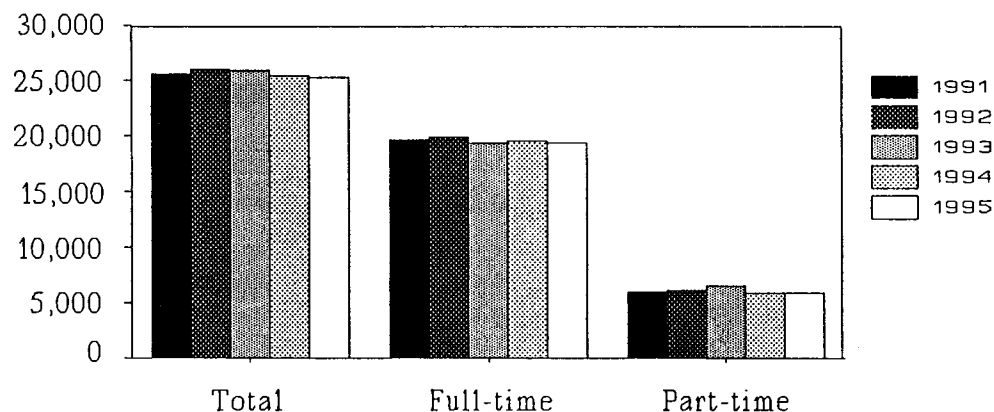

TOTAL ENROLLMENT BY LEVEL, FULL-TIME AND PART-TIME FOR FALL 1991-95

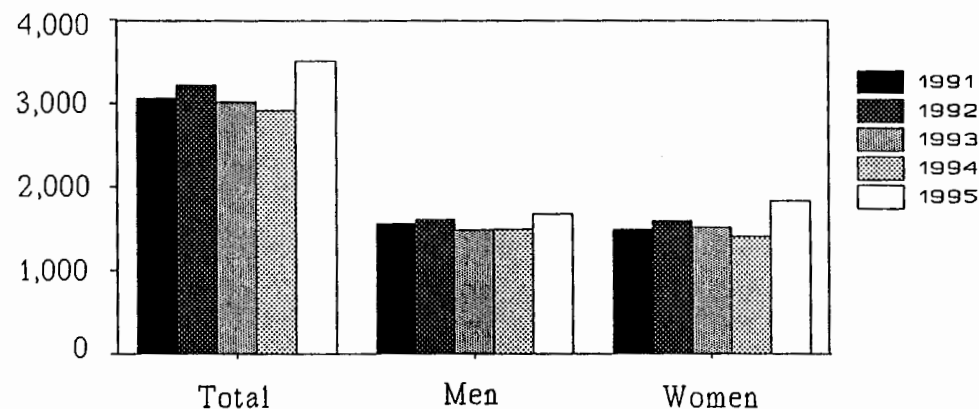

FIRST-TIME FRESHMEN ENROLLMENT BY COLLEGE AND SEX FOR FALL 1991-95

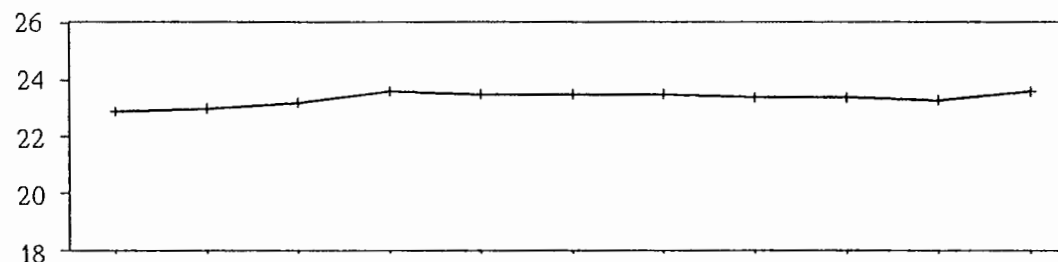

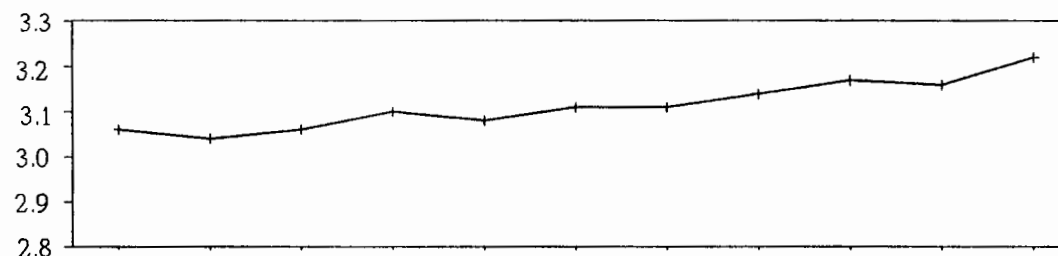

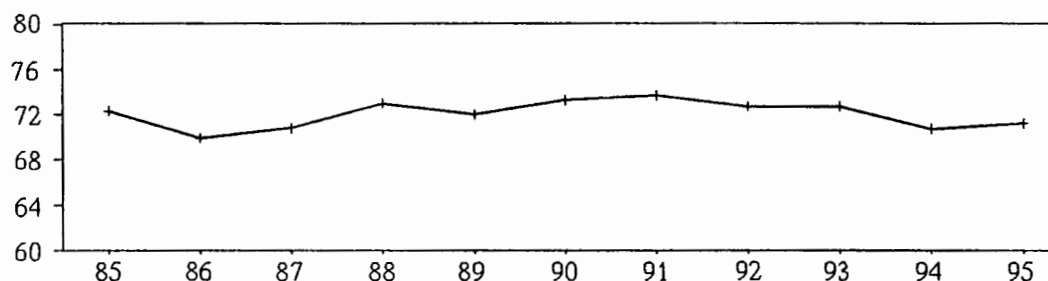
EQUIVALENT ACT

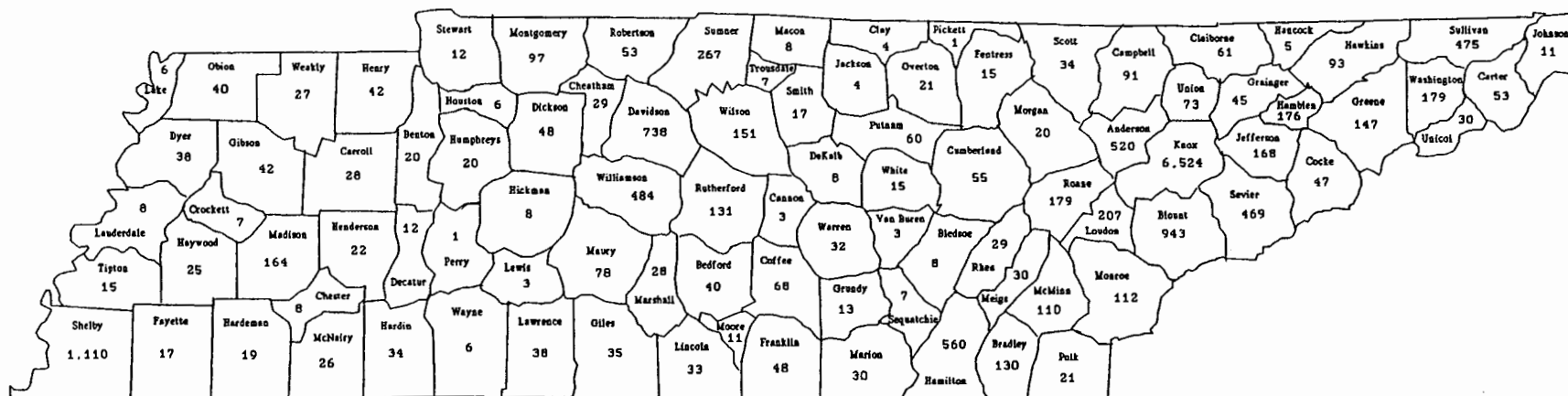

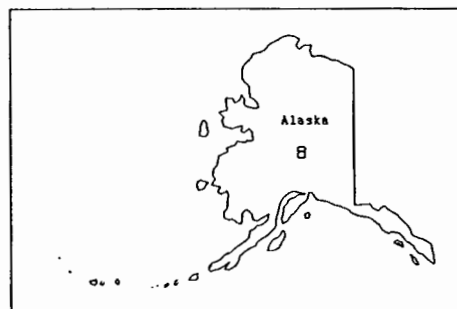

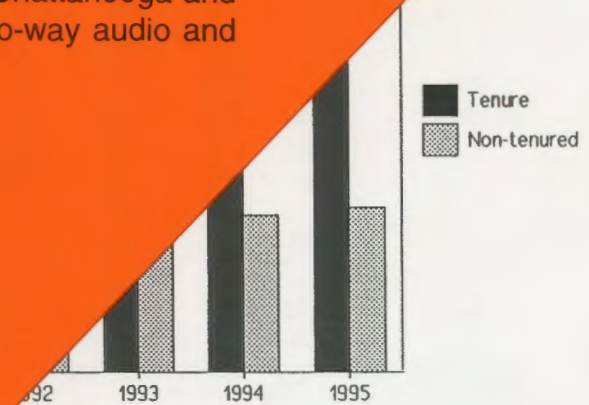

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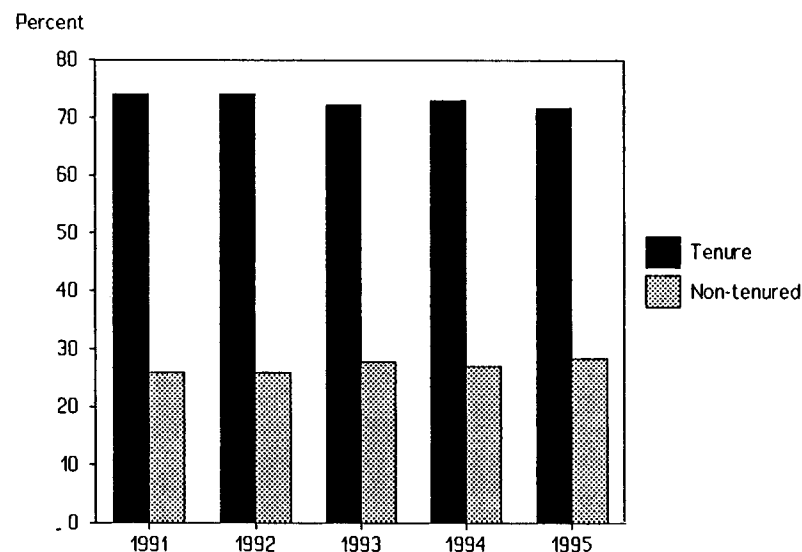

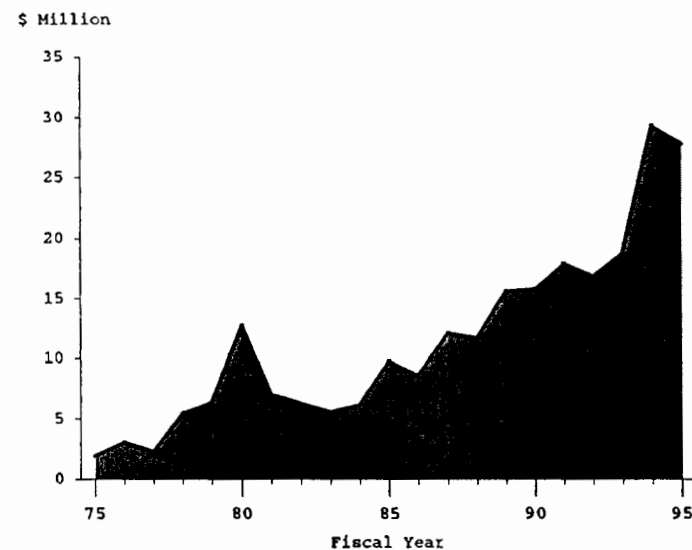

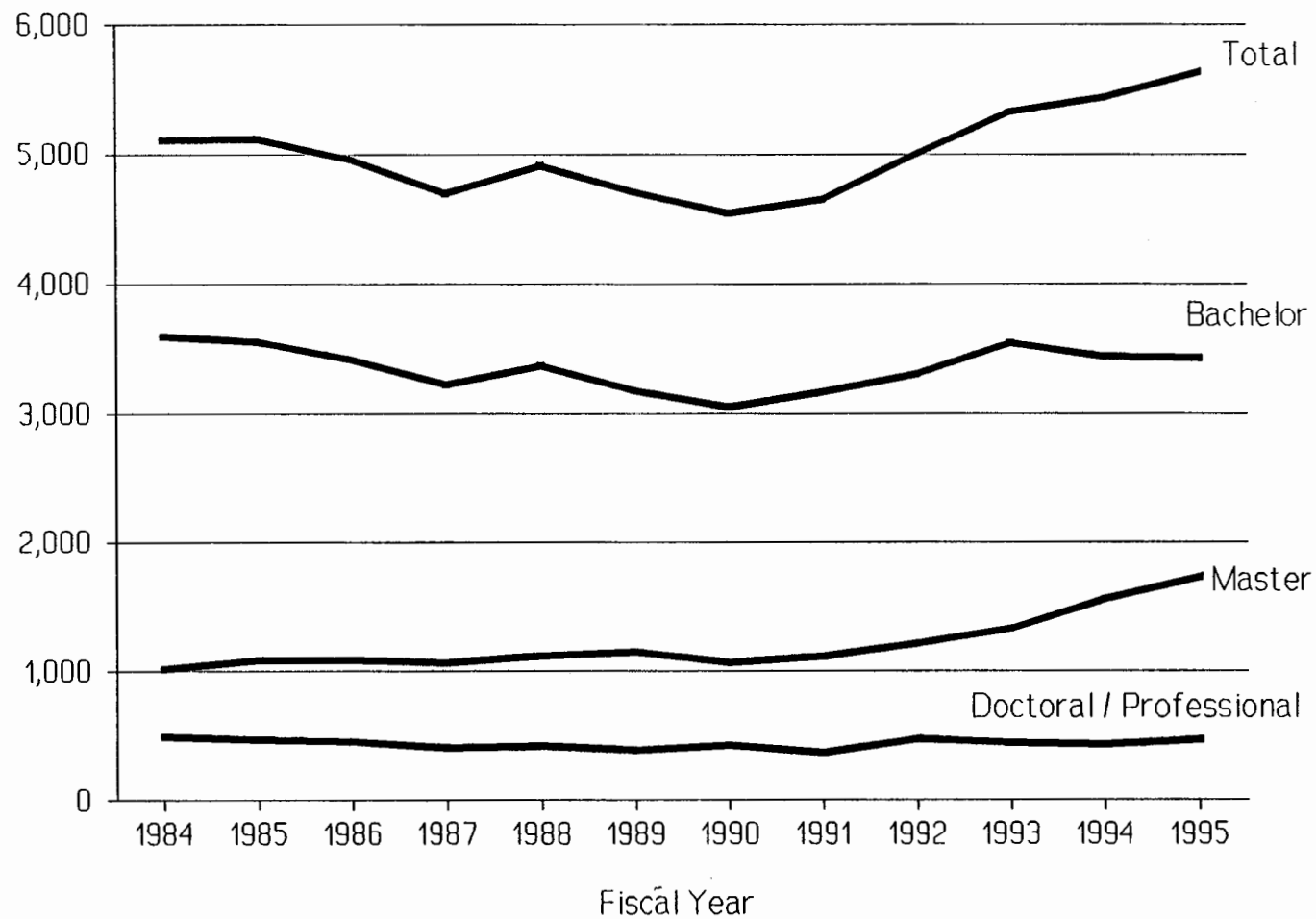

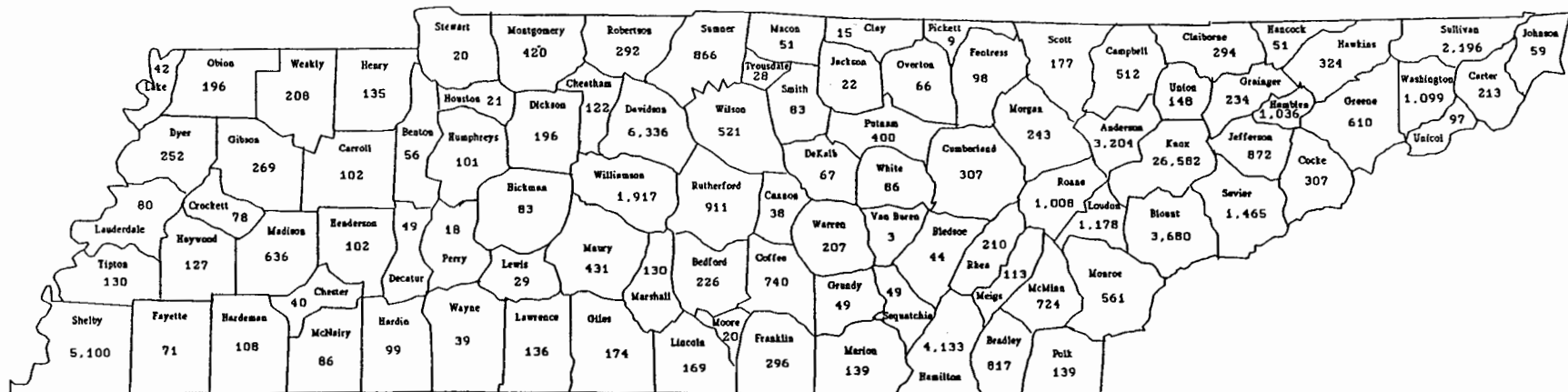
DISTRIBUTION OF UTK ALUMNI BY STATE

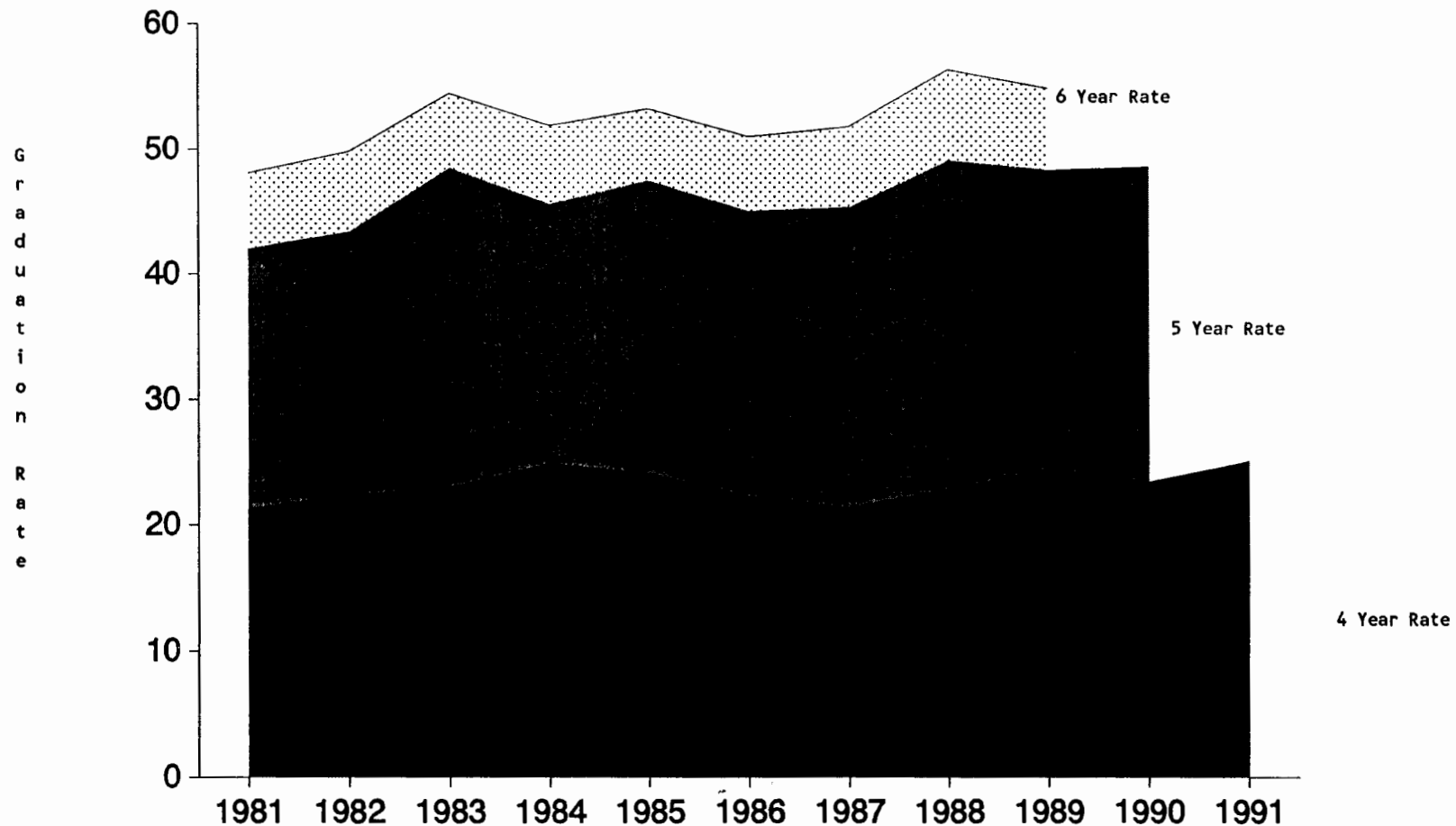

GRADUATION RATES FOR FIRST-TIME FULL-TIME FRESHMEN FOR FALL TERMS 1981-1991 (graph)



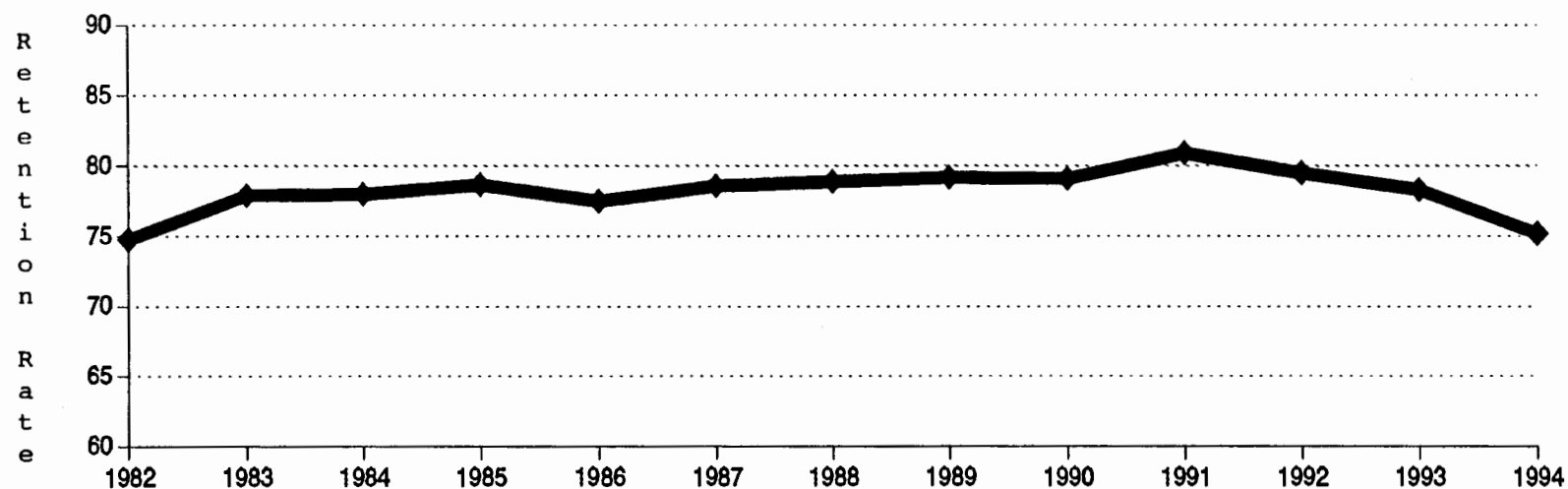

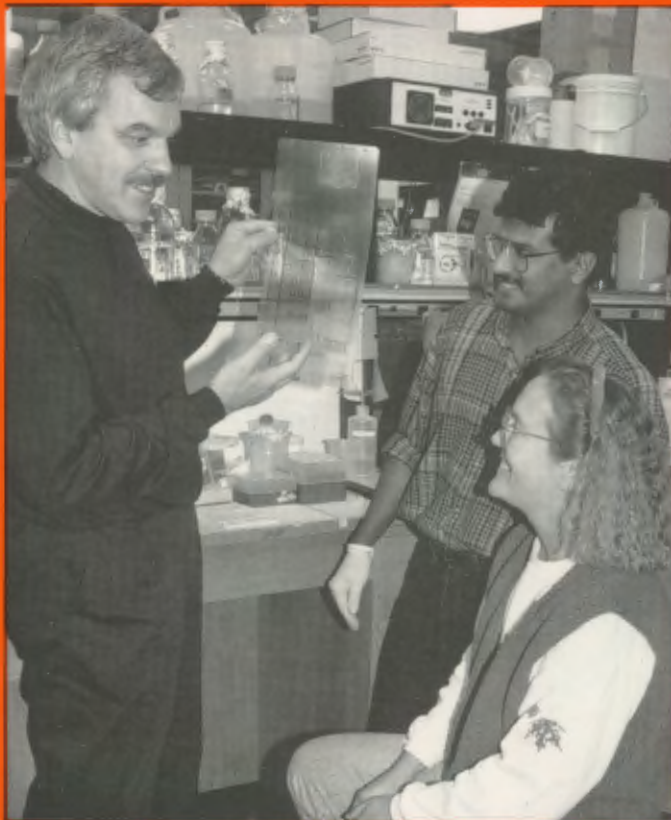
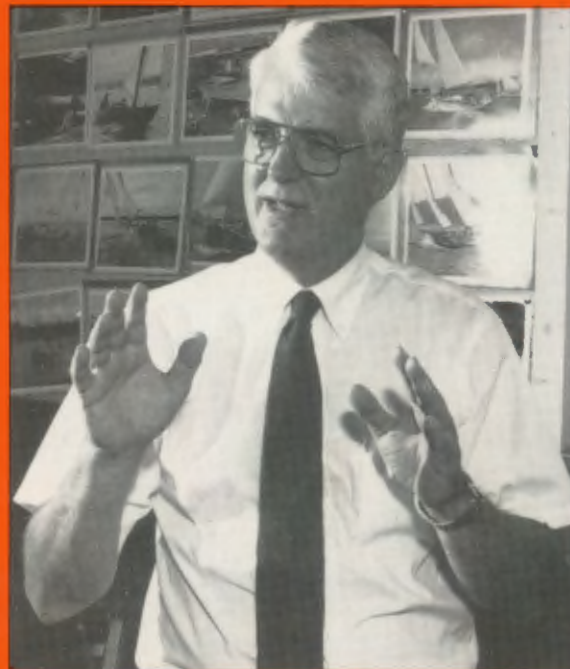

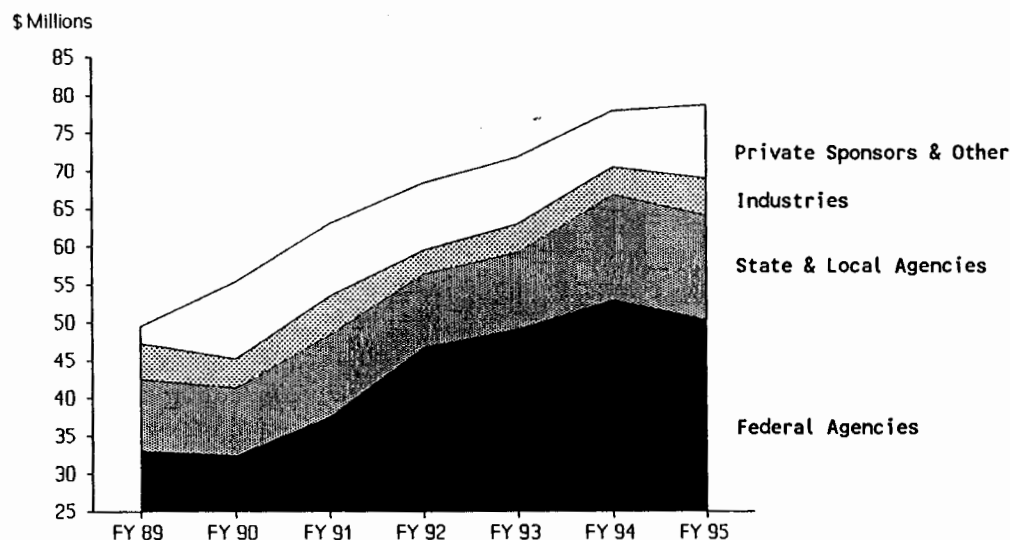

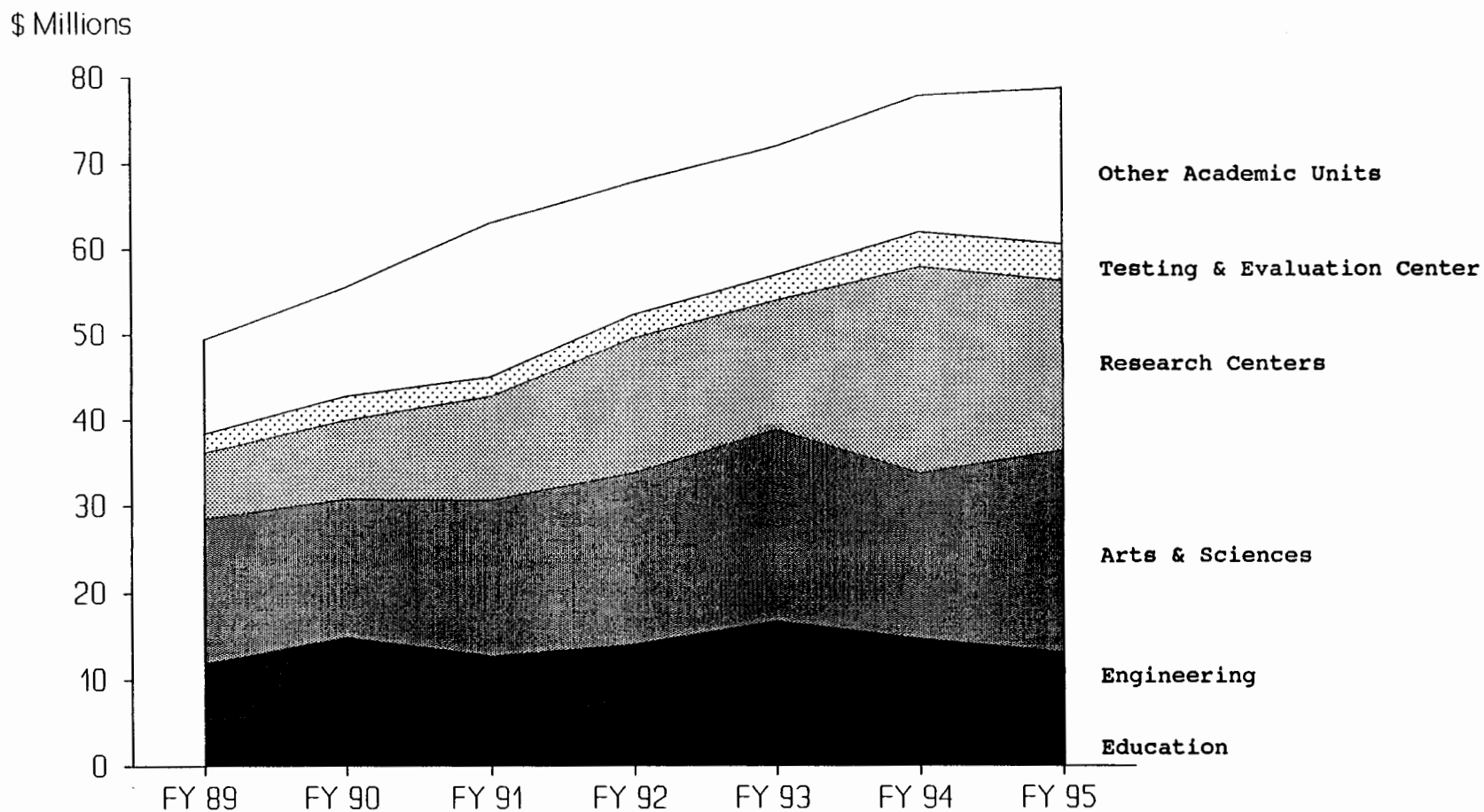

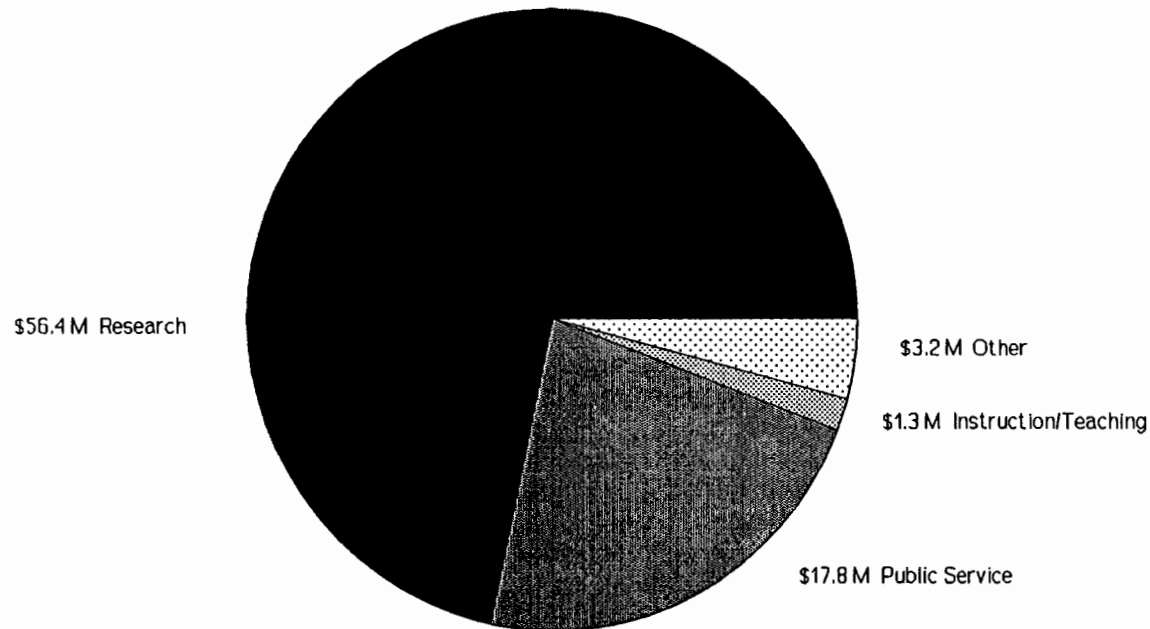
