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### UT Enters Third Century of Teaching, Research and Service

1794 Legislature of the Territory of the United States South of the River Ohio, as one of its first acts, establishes Blount College. 1807 Renamed East Tennessee College, 1827 First known master's degree awarded. 1840 Legislature changes name to East Tennessee University. 1844 First international graduate degree recipient. 1862 The Morrill Act passes. 1862-66 The University was closed and its buildings were occupied and used as a hospital by Confederates and Unionists. 1869 Designated the state's land-grant institution. 1879 Name changed to The University of Tennessee. 1880 Morrill Hall built for agricultural studies. 1881-1912 Blacks enrolled but educated in the Industrial Department at Knoxville College to comply with state's segregation laws. 1886 Chattanooga University, forerunner of UT-Chattanooga, founded. 1888 Master of Science degree approved. 1892 UT becomes co-educational. 1898 First female graduate degree recipient. 1902 Nickname "Volunteers" attributed to sports writers at The Atlanta Constitution. 1913 Agricultural Extension Service established. 1943 First Ph.D. degree on Knoxville campus approved for Chemistry. 1945 Oak Ridge Resident Graduate Program established. 1951 UTK football team under General Robert Neyland wins national championship. 1952 First black graduate student enrolled. 1954 First black graduate degree recipient. 1956 UT Memorial Research Center and Hospital opened in Knoxville. 1961 First black undergraduates admitted in modern times. 1964 UT Space Institute established at Tullahoma. 1965 Phi Beta Kappa chapter installed. 1968 Volunteer Statue completed. 1969 The UT System formed with campuses at Knoxville, Chattanooga, Martin, Memphis and Tullahoma. 1974 UT College of Veterinary Medicine established. 1993 Largest number of graduate students enrolled. 1994 UT celebrates Bicentennial; awards 50,000th graduate degree. 1996 Lady Vols under Coach Pat Summitt win fourth national championship.

### Recent Accomplishments at UTK . . .

#### **UTK Among Nation's Best College Buys**

For the third consecutive year, UTK was ranked one of the best education values among the nation's major universities. U.S. News & World Report ranked UTK the 12th best educational value in the nation for 1996-97. UTK was ranked eighth best educational value in 1995-96, and seventh best in 1994-95. The ranking considered a school's quality rating (academic strengths) divided by tuition, required fees and room and board. U.S. News ranked UTK ninth on its list of national universities whose students have the least amount of debt when they leave school. UTK fees are about 25 percent below the national average for four-year public universities.

Nearly \$6 million in scholarships were awarded in the fall of 1996, compared with \$4.5 million awarded in the fall of 1992. For the second year, UTK offered Bicentennial Scholarships to any Tennessee high school senior with a 3.75 grade-point average and a score of 31 on the ACT. A total of 124 students accepted the four-year, full-tuition grants for fall 1996. Two hundred twenty-nine Bicentennial Scholars were enrolled. UTK awarded 44 African American Achiever Scholarships, bringing the total for the full-tuition, four-year grant to 59. UTK enrolled 37 new National Merit Scholars, bringing the campus total to 130. Thirty-two new McWherter Scholars enrolled at UTK.

#### **UTK Programs Rank Among U.S. Leaders**

UTK graduate programs in law and business were ranked 47th best in their respective fields by *U.S. News & World Report*. The graduate program in advertising was ranked eighth. *U.S. News* ranked the College of Business Administration program No. 32 in the country for 1996. Rankings were based on faculty resources, research activity, test scores, and reputation.

The American College of Trial Lawyers ranked the College of Law No. 1 in the nation in 1996 for excellence in training trial attorneys. Past winners of the ACTL's annual award included Harvard, Yale, New York University, and UCLA.

In spring 1996, the textiles and clothing program in the College of Human Ecology was ranked first among 183 programs in the U.S. by the *Clothing and Textiles Research Journal*. The college has the world's only on-campus, non-woven textile processing laboratory with melt-down and spun-bond lines.

Public Accounting Report called UTK's master of accountancy program the 10th best in the nation in 1996. The undergraduate accounting program ranked No. 20.

The first cooperative master's degree program in information sciences via distance education technology was launched by UTK and the University of Virginia. Using teleconference communications systems, Tennessee students and Virginia students were able to earn an M.S. degree in information sciences without crossing state lines.

#### **UTK Students Are Top Achievers**

Freshmen entering UTK in the fall of 1996 ranked among the best prepared ever, based on ACT entrance exam scores. The UTK average equivalent ACT score was 23.9, the highest ever for an entering freshman class. The 1995 average equivalent ACT figure was 23.6. The highest possible ACT score is 36.

The percentage of African American students who graduated from UTK rose from 33 percent in 1984 to 48.7 percent in 1996.

The UT Lady Vols under Coach Pat Summitt defeated the University of Georgia, 83-65, for an unprecedented fourth national women's basketball title. Previous national championships were won in 1987, 1989 and 1991.

A team of three master's of business administration students from UTK won a national competition in a highly competitive field. They placed first in the National Black MBA Association's annual Council for Advancement and Support of Education competition against a field that included 11 business schools rated in the nation's top 20 by Business Week magazine.

#### 21st Century Campaign Climbs To New Heights

As of the end of 1996, the University of Tennessee 21st Century Campaign received donations or pledges of \$280 million toward its \$308 million goal. The campaign began in October 1994. Funds from the campaign go to scholarships, faculty enrichment, research and academic resources at all UT campuses and units. UTK received more than \$154 million toward its goal of \$175 million.

In the area of private giving, UT passed the \$50 million mark in 1996 for the first time. UT received a total of \$55,838,440 in private gifts for the fiscal year that ended in June, 1996. Also, a record 52,075 alumni and friends made gifts of more than \$13 million to UT's Annual Giving Program. UT leads the South in the number of donors.

#### **UT Teams Up With Businesses and Industries**

UT, the Saturn Corporation and the Environmental Protection Agency announced a two-year study to produce more environmentally friendly cars. UT's Center for Clean Products and Clean Technologies directed the \$750,000 project.

Sun Microsystems Computer Company and UTK became partners in creating a campus SunSite and a center for the development of Java computer language. In 1996, there were only four campus SunSites in the nation.

#### **Neyland Stadium Is Nation's Largest**

What began 75 years ago with a stretch of dirt and a few steel beams became in 1996 the largest on-campus stadium in the U.S., seating 102,544 fans. The Neyland Stadium expansion entailed enclosing the upper deck of the north end zone which added approximately 10,600 new seats.

RECENT HIGHLIGHTS: The 1996 U.S. News and World Report ranked UTC third in the "Best Value" category among over 500 regional universities in the South. The UTC School of Engineering ranked first in the South and eighth in the nation among state institutions that do not grant Ph.Ds. In 1997 UTC plans to offer an M.S. degree in environmental sciences to develop professionals in ecology and bolster Chattanooga's claim to the title "Environmental City." A Teaching Resource Center has been established at UTC to assist faculty in building their teaching skills. UTC has raised more than \$22 million in the 21st Century Campaign and expects to exceed \$25 million before the the drive ends in 1998. UTC's new Institute for Women as Entrepreneurs offers free counseling to women in all stages of business development. In a first for the school, UTC hosted 350 mathematicians from the U.S. and abroad during the Southeastern Section of the American Mathematical Society.

RECENT HIGHLIGHTS: Peter C. Doherty, Ph.D., professor of pediatrics and pathology and chair of the Immunology Department at St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, was named co-winner of the 1996 Nobel Prize for Medicine. The College of Medicine leads Tennessee and is third in the Southeast -- ahead of the University of Miami, North Carolina, Vanderbilt, Meharry and ETSU--with 31% of its graduates choosing primary care. Five Memphis faculty members were ranked among the Best Doctors in America in the March 1996 issue of American Health Magazine. The Scientist listed the medical faculty seventh among southern universities and 36th nationally in the number of times their published works were cited by other researchers. Pharmacy has ranked among the best in the nation for the fourth consecutive year by U.S. News & World Report. The Campbell Clinic Department of Orthopaedic surgery was ranked among the best in the nation. Students in eight collegiate licensure categories scored a pass rate of 95% or above on licensure exams. Urology received a \$1 million gift from the J.R. Hyde III Family Foundation for prostate research, and a \$1.75 million grant from the Assisi Foundation. The state's first School of Biomedical Engineering was established with UT Memphis and the University of Memphis creating the state's first joint degree in biomedical engineering.

**RECENT HIGHLIGHTS:** In the past three years, five of 54 new NASA astronauts have been UTSI graduates. Harvard Professor Emeritus I. Bernard delivered the inaugural Thomas Jefferson Lecture. The chair of excellence in computational mechanics has been funded and a search for candidates is underway. Aviation Systems personnel designed and built a lightning array for a helipad at the Summer Olympics in Atlanta. The first Thomas Jefferson Fellowship was awarded to Andy Jones, Tennessee Tech graduate. Judy Edwards, a national Graduate Engineering Program for Minorities Fellow (Ph.D./computer science) entered UTSI. Robert Herron, a doctoral student in metallurgical engineering, became the first industrial intern to work with Worth Inc. Jim Uselton, president of Sverdrup Corporation, and Dr. Ed Kraft, group vice president for enterprise development at Micro Craft, were selected as UTSI Distinguished Alumni. Dr. Dinesh Mehta co-authored a computer science textbook that is now used by 30 universities and has been translated into four languages. Almost \$1.4 million has been pledged for the 21st Century Campaign.




# TOTAL ENROLLMENT BY LEVEL, FULL-TIME AND PART-TIME FOR FALL 1992-96





### Reaching for the stars . . .

Dr. Harry Y. McSween, professor and head, Department of Biological Sciences, testified before a Congressional subcommittee in September, 1996, regarding the importance of sending a spacecraft to Mars to retrieve rock samples. A NASA team said earlier that it had found evidence of past life on Mars through studies of Martian meteorites. "The question of life on Mars is still open and will require new data and new samples to answer," McSween said. "The NASA work provides a strong motivation for spacecraft missions to Mars, involving thorough reconnaissance, careful selection of landing sites and sample-return missions," McSween told the U.S. Senate Subcommittee on Science, Technology and Space.








#### Bigger, better facilities at UTK . . .




### DISTRIBUTION OF UTK ALUMNI BY STATE



# GRADUATION RATES FOR FIRST-TIME FULL-TIME FRESHMEN FOR FALL TERMS 1981-1992 (graph)








#### Delving into the unknown . . .

Was a comet or meteorite to blame for the 1908 blast over Siberia that exploded with the force of 1,000 Hiroshima bombs, incinerating herds of reindeer and charring hundreds of square miles? Dr. Evans Lyne (right), assistant professor of Mechanical Engineering, and graduate student Richard Fought



were cited in Discover Magazine (September. 1996) regarding their own theory. Russian scientists attribute the explosion to + a comet, although most American researchers contend that a comet would have disintegrated too high in the Earth's atmosphere to have caused so much damage. The UT researchers found that previous studies had over-estimated how much of an object would burn away in Earth's atmosphere and that more of the object could get closer to Earth before pressure tore it apart. Lyne said a comet coming in at a steep enough angle could have exploded low enough to


have caused the widespread damage. Lyne said the research helps scientists understand how much damage a meteorite or comet could cause if one hit Earth. "We need to better understand the physics of objects' entry into the atmosphere to fully appreciate the risk they actually pose -- how large they must be to penetrate the atmosphere," Lyne said.



### ... finding solutions

A team of researchers from the UTK College of Business Administration won an international competition on research in applied econometrics, the application of statistical methods and measurement to economics. The competition required teams to forecast U.S. and Dutch food consumption. Selected first among 28 international teams were: Dr. Hamparsum Bozdogan (seated, background), Dr. Peter Bearse (seated, foreground), and Dr. Alan Schlottmann.


