Additional levels in this library installation are sorely needed for housing books and library materials, for carrells, studies, and seminar space for the graduate programs, and for the microprint and copying equipment which is becoming so necessary. We urge that every consideration be given to provision in the initial unit of as much space in addition to the above described levels as can be realized within monetary boundaries. In any event, we request a freely expansible building.

In summary, then, we are requesting a minimum of one million dollars for library quarters to serve the College of Engineering and the physical and natural sciences departments. Inclusion of Biological Sciences, which would be logical and highly desirable, will require more money.

Work on the plans for the new separate undergraduate library, begun in 1964, continued. G. M. Abel, Assistant Librarian and chief liaison between the architects and the Development Office, the director, associate director, undergraduate librarian, and others worked with Mr. Gaskill of the architectural firm Yeates and Gaskill in review and revision, if called for, of sketches and design. Yeates and Gaskill also designed the Martin branch library, and the Knoxville librarians were on call to assist in the revision and review of plans and sketches for the Martin branch. Miss Eleanor Goehring, Reference Librarian, joined the group mentioned above to advise, upon their request, the planners for the proposed Nashville Center, which is to provide extensive library service.

This seems an opportune time to express appreciation to the fine architects who have done such excellent work for us: Ben McMurry, Jr., of Barber and McMurry in Knoxville, for the Kefauver Wing; William H. Gaskill of Yeates and Gaskill, Memphis, for the Martin branch library and design of the soon-to-be-begun undergraduate library, which promises to produce an outstanding library structure.

### The Kefauver Wing

On June 28 of this year the Estes Kefauver Memorial Library was dedicated, approximately fourteen months after Governor Frank Clement signed a Miscellaneous Appropriations bill providing \$125,000 to construct and equip a wing on the UT Library for the Estes Kefauver papers, given in 1964 to the University by Mrs. Kefauver, through the Estes Kefauver Memorial Foundation. A gem of architectural skill, the wing is a handsome, dignified memorial and, at the same time, an excellent work place for historians and scholars. Every inch of space was used to the best effect with no sacrifice of beauty to utility, or vice versa. The dedication ceremonies were attended by noted political and educational leaders, the Kefauver family, friends and colleagues of the Senator. Senator Henry M. Jackson gave the address, and Governor Clement, as Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the University, accepted the building. The Kefauver collection is considered the University of Tennessee's most valuable source material in the areas of history, government, and political science, a treasure for which we are most grateful.

### Use of the Library

State-wide library use increased 10.5 per cent above last year. In Knoxville, where enrollment went up 8.2 per cent, the total increase in book circulation for the Main Library and branches was 13.6 per cent. Reference questions rose 19.3 per cent; Interlibrary loan transactions went up 19.7 per cent for volumes lent and 19.2 per cent for those borrowed. The greatest circulation increase was noted in Documents where use rose 33 per cent. Memphis and Martin reported increases of 4 per cent and 6 per cent respectively.

### Technical Processes

The Acquisitions Department, in its busiest year ever, handled book, periodical and binding funds of \$487,940. 640 new titles were added to the periodical subscriptions list, making a total of 6,110 periodicals (not including duplicate issues) received by the University of Tennessee's Knoxville libraries. Outstanding and significant additions to the collection are appended.

The Processing Department, which catalogs, classifies, and prepares the materials for use, added 50,245 volumes to the Knoxville collection, nearly 5,000 more than was added last year, representing a great effort for

this department, working as it was with a limited staff, since one of its professional positions was unfilled for the year. Catalogers are in short supply nationally, and the University of Tennessee is fortunate indeed to have a nucleus of dedicated and competent catalogers who each year turn out a tremendous amount of work. The annual number of volumes one cataloger can process has been estimated by time and work experts at 4,000 a year, so it is evident that the seven who added 50,245 volumes last year are highly effective workers deserving of praise and appreciation.

### Gifts

Dr. John C. Hodges, coordinator between the Development Council and the library, has brought the Library Development Program to a major factor in library support. Last year the Program received gifts of \$88,191 and 4,500 books. New endowment funds for the year totaled \$75,156. Since its inauguration in 1959, the Library Development Program has been responsible for gifts of 36,530 books and \$239,928 for the purchase of books. Dr. Hodges, Professor Emeritus and former Chairman of the English Department, works untiringly to make this library equal to the finest in the country. None of the donations he is responsible for can be any greater than his own--that of his time, energy, and devotion to the cause of the University of Tennessee and its library. He is an inspiration and a challenge to us all, and we take this opportunity to thank him most gratefully.

G. M. Abel attended an institute studying the changing environment for library services in metropolitan areas, held in Allerton Park at the University of Illinois. Robert Harrison, in charge of library properties, attended annual meetings of the Kentucky Microfilm Association in Lexington and the National Microfilm Association Washington, D. C. David Kirk, Stacks Supervisor, went to Atlanta for the Institute on System Planning for Library Automation; G. M. Abel, LaNelle Vandiver, Paul Trentham, Norman Watkins and David Kirk attended the Machine Records Conference in Gatlinburg.

Helen Hier, at the request of the Committee on Grants of the Association of College and Research Libraries, visited Southern Missionary College in Collegedale, Tennessee, to advise on the strengthening of the reference collection. G. M. Abel was a member of the Visiting Committee of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools at Tarleton College, Stephenville, Texas, and advised Union College in Barbourville, Kentucky, on their library building plans.

Other activities:--Tom Rogero edited the most recent volume of library lectures, which contained Lectures 16, 17, and 18.

Lecture No. 18 was given by Dr. Stephen A. McCarthy, Director of Libraries at Cornell, on March 28.

John Dobson, for the fourth consecutive year, edited the Tennessee Librarian, the quarterly publication of the Tennessee Library Association. Don Jett, Science Librarian, again served as business manager.

The Library Staff Endowment Fund for the purchase of library books rose to \$2,122.

The Mary E. Baker Library School Scholarship of \$1,000 was raised by the entire staff and awarded to Carol Monroe, Undergraduate Library Assistant.

Branch Libraries

A Science-Technology Library is the most urgent need for the next biennium. Accessibly located where Science Hall now stands, it can serve the scientists and engineers on the Hill to far greater advantage than is presently possible with our three cramped and inadequate branch libraries, Biology, Science, and Engineering. The materials needed by the clientele of these three branches overlap; they should be accessible in one appropriate and modern facility. The students and faculty in these disciplines are handicapped and frustrated by lack of space for seating, studies, seminar rooms, and modern equipment (copying machines, microprint readers and printers, among others), as well as space for the housing of books and printed materials, the most basic of library needs!

The University of Tennessee employs experienced and trained staff for each library; it has through the years purchased expertly selected books for its high-caliber faculty and student body, who are now forced to seek these books in three widely separated library facilities, and often to wait for them to be brought from some distant campus storage space. It is a waste and a hindrance; library quarters for these increasingly important areas of knowledge should serve rather than hamper.

Our cost estimate, based on our construction experience alone, and without assistance from architects or engineers, is \$2,000,000 for a science-technology library to serve growing graduate programs and undergraduate enrollments.

The other branch libraries, Agriculture, Education, Business, and Law, are in quarters that fall far short of meeting space needs for books and readers. We urge that additions approved in the University building program for the next four years be sure to include expansion for the Education, Business, and Law libraries. More space will be available to the Agriculture Library in Morgan Hall when the Plant Sciences building is completed. New shelving, chairs, tables, and staff furniture will be needed, at an estimated cost of \$35,000.

## Main Library

Faculty studies, seminar, work area:--The Library Committee places the highest priority on faculty studies. A minor construction job could provide twenty-five studies, a seminar, and much needed work space for Technical Services. The estimated cost is \$65,000, and there is a possibility that a donor may provide as much as a third of this estimate.

Shelving:--When the new Undergraduate Library building is completed, the UGL area in the Main Library will provide another stack level. More stack area will be released for books by moving federal documents from the third stack to what is now the Reserve Book Room. Costs for equipping these two areas are estimated at \$27,000 for UGL and \$10,000 for RBR.

For the first year of the biennium, to provide emergency shelving which is badly needed, we are asking for \$4,000 for the main stack area and \$3,000 for the present Undergraduate Library to provide additional shelving which is needed in the interim before UGL moves into its new building.

Air conditioning:--Lack of temperature and humidity controls in the old part of the Main Library is becoming critical. Last summer resignations of two capable and long-term library assistants were found to have been motivated by the oppressive atmospheric conditions in their department. Both readers and staff find the public service areas in the old building (Circulation, the card catalog, Reference, the reading lounge, and the Reserve Book Room) to be almost unbearable in the summer. Dr. Spivey said: "In the new biennium we shall do some new constructing and some further air-conditioning, until finally we have completed the renovation and the air-conditioning of our major buildings. The library is among those on the waiting list."

## Books, Periodicals, and Binding

For the first year of the biennium, we ask an increase of \$150,000 over the current \$450,000 to meet requests from the faculty and staff for books and new periodical subscriptions; to begin a buying program for the new Undergraduate Library; and to increase the binding allotment.

For the second year, we request that \$50,000 be added to the above amount:

## Equipment

We estimate we will need \$30,000 each year of the biennium (a total of \$60,000) for miscellaneous equipment: desks, chairs, and typewriters for new staff; counters for reference indexes, Kardex units; card catalog cabinet for the Science Library; shelf list cabinets, book trucks, vacuum cleaners; safety step ladders for stack area; microfilm readers, micro reader-printer, micro-fiche cabinets, etc.

## Operating

Our estimate for operating expenses during the biennium is \$98,800. This increase of around \$10,000 over our expenditures for the past two years is needed to cover expanded services and price increases.

## Staff

For the first year, we will need eleven additional non-academic staff members and one academic staff member, assigned as follows: academic, Reference; non-academic, Acquisitions 3, Circulation 3, and one each for Reference, Processing, Binding, Education, Law.

For the second year, we will need twelve additional non-academic staff members: Undergraduate Library 8, Processing 1, Binding 1, Documents 2.

We ask for \$5,000 to take inventory of the Main Library collection, which has not been done since 1962 and should not be delayed much longer. Three teams of 2 persons each working three months could accomplish a major part of this project. This amount is included in our request for temporary help which also covers pages, book cleaners, turnstile attendants, receiving room clerk, attendants for Xerox machines and microform readers and materials. The allotment for student help, also "temporary," includes an increase in the hourly rate from \$1 to \$1.10 the first year and to \$1.25 the second year. We request 165 additional student hours.

Our total request is for \$1,059,332 for our regular staff and \$250,363 for temporary help, including inventory, for the biennium.
