Where in the WORLD is Arjun?

Most of the southern U.S. experienced an unusual winter storm last week. But, it's nothing compared to the mountains of Ladakh, India near Tibet and China. Arjun visited in 2015 for a small arms and light weapons (SALW) training session with the Indo-Tibetan Border Police Force. The altitude varied from 12,000 to 18,500 feet, and average of April temperatures sit around 0 degrees Fahrenheit!
